Southern California Track Aces Bid For Grid Fame



The University of Southern California is turning to its track and field stars for material to build another national championship football team. Here are Norman Paul, low hurdler and broad jumper, who is out for a halfback berth under Coach Howard Jones; Jess Hill, one-time broad jump champion, who won fame in football and baseball, and Dick Barber, holder of the I. C. A. A. A. broad jump record. Barber understudied Jim Musick at fullback and will be out for the varsity next season.

So great has been its luck in turning track stars into football stars that Southern California will try it again next fall.

This time the call will go to Norman Paul, low hurdler and broad jumper. Paul has announced that he will be a candidate next season for one of the fullback berths on Coach Howard Jones' team.

Jones was well pleased with the development since he loses some great backfield men through graduation and Paul was an all-state halfback when he played football at Santa Ana.

Paul weighs 185 pounds and will be the fastest man on next year's squad, excepting only Dick Barber, who, like Paul, made a late decision to try competing both in track and football.

Barber played football when he was at Long Beach high school but he gave it up when he entered Southern California. He was content to coast along and make himself the intercollegiate broad jump champion, which title he won in the I. C. A. A. A. meet last spring with a leap of 25 feet, 3 1/2 inches.

His fall he heard that Jones was looking for a fullback to alternate with Jim Musick and Barber turned out for practice. He advanced rapidly from the fourth team, then the third and finally he became Musick's understudy. Barber looked mighty good in the games he finished and next year he will be regular fullback.

Barber's feat is somewhat of a duplicate of that of Jesse Hill, who once held the I. C. A. A. A. A. broad jump championship and who became a great fullback in his senior year at Southern California. Hill now coaches football and plays professional baseball. He does the latter so well that the New York Yankees are said to be planning to take him to the big leagues the year after next from Hollywood in the Pacific Coast League.

Another track man who made good in football in a big way at Southern California is Bob Hall, the tackle. Hall, who graduates this fall, is the I. C. A. A. A. A. shotput title holder.

Deer Withstand Onslaughts of Hunters In 1931

Deer more than held their own against the inroads of hunters upon the Angeles National Forest last year.

Even though 387 more of their number were reported killed than in 1930, the deer population of the national forest is said to have shown an increase of 432, making a total of 4,800 head.

No reasons for the increased number of these animals is given in a report made by Wm. V. Mendonhall, supervisor of the forest, but the increase in deer killed is believed to have been the result of unemployment.

Jobless Turn Hunters
"Unemployment has meant a greater number of hunters than we have ever had on the forest before," Mr. Mendonhall said. Forest officers examined 4,621 licenses during the hunting season, and 10,043 hunters registered in the forest.

"The forest service is grateful to acknowledge that among this large body of hunters, there were only 13 who violated game laws and not a single person who started a forest fire. Inasmuch as the hunting season is normally one of great danger to forests, we feel that a remarkable record of sportsmanship has been hung up."

There is no danger of deer on the Angeles National Forest becoming so plentiful that they would suffer for lack of subsistence, Mr. Mendonhall believes. Sufficient feed and room exists for many times the number of game animals supported at present, he said.

Girls Smarter Than Boys?

Dept. of Education Reports They Are in This Country

Are Los Angeles county girls smarter than the boys?
If figures of the state department of education don't lie, they are, and throughout California as well.
It seems that during the 1930 school year, only 1.8 per cent of the elementary school boys "skipped" grades while 2 per cent of the girls were above normal.
At the same time, the education department's bureau of research has figured that 84 per cent of the boys in elementary schools of the state had to repeat grades, while only 6 per cent of the girls were held back because of unsatisfactory grades.
The boys do have their statistical inning, however. While the girls may start out faster in the first grade, the boys make up for it by the time the eighth grade is reached, the statistics show.
While only 0.6 per cent of the boys progress more rapidly than normal in the first grade, as compared to 0.7 per cent of the opposite sex, the ratio has increased to 2.4 per cent for the men-to-be in the eighth grade as against 2.3 per cent.

Hunting Permits Last 18 Months

Licenses Are Put On Fiscal Year Basis Now

Hunting and angling licenses issued this year will be effective from January 1, 1932, to June 30, 1933.

The state division of fish and game has adopted this plan to put the licenses on the basis of fiscal years. The 18-month licenses will be sold at one and one-half times the regular fee. Following June 30, 1932, the licenses will be for 12 months at their regular rates. According to a tentative check of income from these licenses in 1932, it is estimated the total will be well below that of 1930.
