"Spirit" is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon on Sunday, February 7, in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass. The Golden Text is from one of Paul's epistles: "We have received, not the spirit of the world, but the spirit which is of God; that we might know the things that are freely given to us of God."
One of the Scriptural selections in the Lesson-Sermon cites the incident of the Master's healing of the lunatic whom the disciples had failed to cure. The citation continues: "Then came the disciples to Jesus apart, and said, Why could not we cast him out? And Jesus said unto them, Because of your unbelief; for verily I say unto you, If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye shall say unto this mountain, Remove hence to yonder place; and it shall remove; and nothing shall be impossible unto you. Howbeit this kind goeth not out but by prayer and fasting."
A passage from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, states, "If our hopes and affections are spiritual, they come from above, not from beneath, and they bear as of old the fruits of the Spirit."

of Congressman Hastings, and which provides for similar duties. All of these bills are pending before the House Committee of Ways and Means.
Senator Samuel M. Shorridge of California has a bill providing a \$1 tariff on each barrel of imported petroleum and 50 per cent ad valorem duty on petroleum products. The fate of this bill, which was referred to the Senate Committee on Commerce, is uncertain, as bills for raising revenue, under the Constitution, can originate only in the House of Representatives.
