Husbands Have a Place in the Kitchen, - Says Noted Home Economist

Miss B. Edna Galvin, young western home economist, today punctured the old illusion that men are no good in a kitchen when she declared that men like to cook as much as do women, and in some cases more so. Miss Galvin based her contention on the fact that men often dash into the wilds on camping trips—not to hunt—as often mistakenly supposed—but to show off their prowess as cooks when it comes to broiling steaks and flipping flap-jacks.

"Husbands like to entertain, too, so why not let them broil the steak at home?" she asks Torrance housewives. Miss Galvin revealed today that she intends to present any number of stag party ideas at the Torrance Herald-Safeway Stores three-day cooking school which opens at the Woman's clubhouse March 2 and continues March 3 and 4.

Miss B. Edna Galvin, who has been chosen to conduct the school, is a member of the Safeway Homemakers' Bureau and widely known for her modern practical ideas on cooking and homemaking. She is one of the ten home economists assisting Mrs. Julia Lee Wright, national director of this unusual home service which sponsors the helpful weekly talks heard over 20 western radio stations every Friday morning. She is heard in Torrance over Station KFI.

At the Safeway Homemakers' Bureau headquarters Miss Galvin works with a complete testing kitchen where every recipe and every idea is carefully tried out before it can be included for any public presentation, whether in newspaper, at a cooking school or over the air.

In response to the Bureau's invitation, thousands of letters pour in each week requesting information on some household problem. The queries, she declares, come from every nook and corner of the eleven western states wherever there is a home and someone in it who prepares the well-known three meals a day.
