RAPPAPORT CLOSE OUT BEGINS FRI.

J. J. Sugarman Co. Offers Stock and Fixtures to Public at Sacrifice

The last chapter in one of the oldest retail establishments in Torrance is to be enacted beginning tomorrow morning when the entire stock and fixtures of Rappaport's Department Store at 1508 Cabrillo avenue are to be sold out by J. J. Sugarman Company, Ltd., largest merchandise liquidators in the West.

Sugarman bought the Rappaport stock and fixtures a short time ago at a price which represented only a fraction of its inventory value, and these sacrifices are to be passed on to the public, says Jack Isenstein, who is in charge of the close-out sale for J. J. Sugarman Company.

By an odd coincidence, Mr. Isenstein, who is conducting the sale, himself founded the first retail store in Torrance over 30 years ago, later disposing of it when he became associated with Sugarman. He still owns considerable real estate in this city.

On another page in this issue are advertised a few of the outstanding bargains offered in the Rappaport disposal sale, but many other articles equally attractive in price are to be found by shoppers at the sale, which opens Friday morning at 9 o'clock. The line includes ready-to-wear, dry goods, men's, women's and children's furnishings, shoes, hats, home furnishings and notions. The store fixtures are also to be sold.

War Veterans Sponsor School Essay Contest

General Leonard A. Wood camp of the United Spanish War Veterans, whose membership comprises residents of Hermosa Beach, Torrance and Redondo Beach who participated in the war with Spain, is conducting an essay contest with the pupils of all schools, graded, high and private, as participants, the object of which is to ascertain just how much the results of one of the shortest wars in American history.

Thirty-four years ago, as the result of the sinking of the battleship "Maine" in Havana harbor, Congress authorized President McKinley to declare war upon Spain and to call for a volunteer force of 300,000 men, which, augmented by the then standing regular army was considered strong enough to carry the war to a successful issue.

Thirty-four years, is a long time to recall, even to a member of that conflict, and it will be a test of scholarship for the present day child to give an interesting resume of the days of '98. As a reward for their efforts, the writers of the two best essays will be given prizes, and the winning essays will be printed in the local paper in the city in which the contestant lives. Essays should be headed "Facts about the Spanish-American War," and sent to Alfred Goutard, postmaster, Torrance, Calif., before May 1, on which date the contest closes.


Keeper of Light Gets Citation

Crail Opposes Increased Tax On Motorist

Opposition to the obnoxious "nuisance taxes" being proposed on automobiles and accessories as a means of raising additional revenue for the Federal government was expressed today in a telegram from Congressman Joe Crail, now attending the session of Congress in Washington. "Additional taxes should be raised in some other manner," present the owner of an automobile or truck is taxed from every source. The city taxes him, the county taxes him and the state taxes him by means of the gasoline tax. Any further imposition of taxes on automobiles, trucks, tires or other accessories would be class legislation, which is repugnant to American citizens.

Congressman Crail declared he is ready to aid in finding the best and least objectionable methods of taxation to meet whatever increased taxes may be shown to be absolutely necessary to defray the expenses of government. "However, I am against the imposition of even one cent of additional taxes until we have found that there is no other way to raise money, or until it is shown that the increased taxes are absolutely necessary," he wired.

Apply Now For Election Board Job In Torrance

Many people who applied last year for positions on the various precinct election boards acting in the county elections will have to apply again if they wish to serve this year. Appointments on the boards are made only from year to year, so that it is necessary to file the application annually. Twelve precincts will be set up in the Torrance district for the coming primary in May, which means that there will be jobs for some fifty people, and those Torrance people who wish to serve should make their application at once. The boards are selected at least forty days before the date of election, which indicates that there is not much time left to put in a bid for these jobs.
