offer second servings, the same order is followed, the hostess usually taking something in order that the guests may feel free to do so.

At present, fewer courses are favored for even the most formal

dinners and most home dinners consist of three courses—rarely more than four—and should be planned to require as little service as possible. These courses are, or may be:

- Cocktail, Soup or Broth
- Main Course
- Dessert and Beverage

The salad may be served with the main course, before it, or after it. The cocktail course, such as fish or fruit cocktail may be on

the table before the guests are seated, as are the olives and celery. However, if soup is the first course, the guests are seated first and the soup is brought in one at a time to avoid the disaster of pouring soup down the guests' backs. Emily Post says that bringing soup in two at a time is not a question of etiquette, but of skill.

If you have a maid or someone to help with the serving at special affairs, the plates may be served in the kitchen or at the table by the host. In either case, they are placed before the guest by the maid. Most authorities agree that an entirely "left" service is preferable, that is, placing and removing all dishes from the left hand of the host with the exception of the beverages which are served from the right with the guest to use his right hand in serving himself. Sometimes a combination of right and left hand service is used, the dishes being placed and removed from the right. This is equally as correct but not quite as new as the all left service, so the hostess simply decides which method is easiest and most practical for her household.

#### Removing Dishes

In removing dishes, take off the meat platter and serving dishes first. Then the soiled china, glass and silver, and last any unused clean utensils that will not be needed in the next course. Unless the hostess is waiting on the table, her plate is the first one to be removed; if she is serving, she starts with the cover at her right, and continues around the table, clearing her own place last. Dishes are removed without stacking. However, if salad is served with the main course, its plates may be taken out at the same time as the dinner plate, one in each hand.

The dessert and beverage may be served from the kitchen or at the table by the hostess. She may ask her guests how they prefer their coffee or just pass the cream and cube sugar.

Here are a few interesting facts:

When filling water glasses they are not lifted from the table but are poured from the right and filled 3/4 full.

When the course is finished, the knife and fork, the latter with tines up, are laid on the plate side by side, the handle slightly to the right. If the waitress, in removing the plates, places her thumb over these handles, she may save herself the embarrassment of having them slip off and clatter to the floor.

It is perfectly correct to use a knife to cut salad whenever necessary.

A coffee spoon or teaspoon is always laid on the saucer, never left in the cup. It is used only for stirring.

The following foods are eaten with spoons: fruit cocktail, oranges, grapefruit, alligator pears, and cantaloupe served in the rind; stewed fruit of all kinds; berries, cereals, compotes of rice or fruit, soft boiled eggs, soups, and all soft desserts such as custards, jellies, and ices.

The following foods may be eaten with the fingers: bread, rolls, crackers, crisp cakes, wafers, and cookies, small firm sandwiches, firm chicken or Swiss or American, salted nuts, celery, olives, bonbons, grapes, cherries, strawberries (when served with hulls), artichokes, asparagus tips (the long tender stalks are cut and eaten with a fork), corn on the cob, potato chips and julienne strips.

Small pieces should be broken from slices of bread, toast, muffins, crackers, biscuits, and so forth—buttered, and then carried to the mouth. Crackers, breadsticks, or cheese straws served with soup or salad should also be broken in small pieces.

French fried potatoes are eaten with a fork.

Spaghetti served Italian style is wound around the fork.

When carving or serving is done at the table and a plate is passed for a second helping, the knife and fork are left on the plate a little at one side.

### Southern Pacific Installs Cooling Device On Trains

Regardless of climatic conditions prevailing along the transcontinental rail lines after June 1, dining car patrons on Southern Pacific's Overland and Golden State Limited trains will enjoy the comfort of the finest man-made weather.

This was made known here today by F. S. McGinnis, vice president in charge of system passenger traffic for the company, who stated that plans have been completed for installation of the most modern air cooling and conditioning equipment in dining cars of the two crack trains operating between the Pacific Coast and Chicago.

The air conditioning system, McGinnis said, will control the temperature and humidity in the cars during both summer and winter. In the summer the air will be cooled by passing over ice, it was explained, and in winter it will be warmed to a comfortable temperature regardless of outside weather conditions.

The improvement in the diner equipment will greatly increase the comfort of passengers. McGinnis declared, by flooding the car with clean air, washed free of dust, while the temperature is kept constant by thermostatic control.
