Meat Cutting Demonstration to Be Held Fri.

Number of Best Cuts to Be Given Away at Cooking School on Final Day

A half of a baby beef will be cut up and the various cuts of meat explained by Walter Balsom, market supervisor of the Safeway Stores, as a special attraction at the Torrance Herald-Safeway Stores Cooking School in the Woman's Clubhouse at the closing session of the school Friday afternoon. Mr. Balsom is an authority on the subject of meat cutting and he presents his subject in a very interesting manner. Homemakers at the Friday class will learn that some of the less expensive cuts of meat have more food value and better flavor than some of the more expensive ones. Mr. Balsom will explain many things about buying and preparing meats that you have often wanted to know. A number of the best cuts from the baby beef that he uses in demonstrating his talk will be given away together with the baskets of groceries and dishes prepared by Miss B. Edna Galvin, home economist in charge of the cooking school.

Redondo defeated the Torrance high track team last Friday. The Bay League team showed a large amount of versatile material.


LEAP YEAR PARTY
