Crackers and Progress

Crackers have come a long way since the days of the "cracker barrel" in the corner stores. A cracker then was either a hardtack or a soda cracker, more or less broken, and sold in the bulk in a paper bag. They tasted mighty good, and for that matter, they still do. But now you don't buy "just crackers" as there is almost infinite variety from which to choose, from the tiny oysterettes to the dainty bits of fairy sweetness which literally melt in your mouth. They come as attractively boxed and wrapped as any fancy candies.

These are a wonderful help on the emergency shelf as they will keep indefinitely in a cool dry place. However, most families do not let them stay very long on even the emergency shelf—but watch that each box is replaced as fast as it is used. The wise homemaker knows that few foods possess as high energy yielding values as crackers, yet she does not always take full advantage of the time-saving possibilities which they offer in daily meal planning. There are crackers for every course "from soup to nuts" and you'll be surprised to find how many ways they can be used. Crackers are grand extenders when unexpected company comes, in fact I know one family who won't eat scrambled eggs ex-

cept with the addition of crackers which have been soaked in milk and added to the eggs before cooking. Creamed mixtures may be served on crisp crackers in place of toast as may canape pastes and spreads for open-faced sandwiches. For afternoon tea, nearly every kind of cracker may be used. Many dishes can be made using crackers either boiled to a meal or broken in small pieces, for the main ingredient. Both graham and plain crackers are becoming increasingly popular used this way. Doubtless the good doctor, Sylvester Graham, for whom Graham crackers were named over a hundred years ago, would have difficulty recognizing his namesake in the tempting concoctions in which it is now appearing. If you have not tried graham cracker pastry you have a real treat in store, for you.

A cake which combines graham crackers and the ever convenient ground chocolate is a delicious confection. A prime favorite with children and suitable for either luncheon or dinner is a chocolate pudding using the plain soda crackers. It is also very simple to make.

Kite Flyers Are Warned to Avoid Wire Contacts

C. J. Koiker, district manager of the Southern California Edison Company, issues a timely warning to all boys and girls who are fond of flying kites to be very careful not to let their kite strings become

entangled with power lines or light wires. Sometimes in trying to free the string the wires are pulled together with a resulting short circuit, the wires are burned through, and fall into the street to the danger of all passersby. Above all, Mr. Koiker says, the boys and girls should not use a metal string to fasten their kites as the contact with power or light lines is very dangerous.

Narbonne will open the spring track season with a triangular meet with South Gate and Leuzinger on Friday, March 4, at Griffin Field. Coach Comrada is also preparing to send three teams to the relay meet at Long Beach on Saturday, March 5, entering one in the 440-yard run, the medley and the four-mile run.
