Commander Deininger's statement follows: "The executive committee of Post 8, Crossland Post, American Legion, held last evening, the officers of the local post re-affirmed its cardinal principle of taking no part in partisan politics. Campaigning for any candidate or group of candidates will not be permitted at any meeting of the American Legion, neither will this organization endorse any candidates. While many Legionnaires as individuals may work in behalf of their favorite candidates, no discussion of any candidate for public office will be permitted to come before any meeting of the American Legion."

In order to relieve the American Legion of any possible criticism, Earl Conner, who is a candidate for city council, resigned last night from the executive committee. The by-laws of the American Legion prohibit public officials from holding office. Conner's resignation was accepted with deep regrets by the executive committee.
