ORDINANCE NO. 230. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 139, HERETOFORE ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE ON THE 26TH DAY OF JULY, 1928, AND PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE BE SUBMITTED TO THE ELECTIONS OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE ON A SPECIAL BALLOT AT THE GENERAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF TORRANCE, APRIL 11TH, 1932, TO DETERMINE WHETHER THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BECOME EFFECTIVE.

The City Council of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows: SECTION 1. That Ordinance No. 139, being "An Ordinance of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, providing for the levy and collection of a tax of ten cents on each One Hundred Dollars of assessed valuation of property for parks, music and advertising purposes" be, and the same is hereby repealed.

SECTION 2. The City Council of the City of Torrance shall cause this Ordinance to be submitted to the electors on a special ballot at the General Municipal Election to be held in the City of Torrance, April 11th, 1932, to determine whether this Ordinance shall become effective; and until said election shall have been held and a majority of said electors shall have voted in favor of making this Ordinance effective, the same shall not take effect. If the same shall be approved at said election, then this Ordinance shall take effect immediately, as soon as the vote has been canvassed by the City Council and the result thereof declared by said Council.

SECTION 3. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once a week for four successive weeks in the Torrance Herald, a newspaper published in the City of Torrance.
