## Garden Talk

### Are Your Plants Hungry?

Soil fertility and soil preparation are of great importance. Best results are to be obtained in the garden. Heavy soils are made more easily tiltable by an application of hydrated lime and by the presence of humus. The lime is best applied and cultivated into the surface after the soil has been plowed.

All types of soils should contain humus, which is decomposing organic matter, and is providing by spading in of organic materials such as leaves, straw, barnyard fertilizers, etc. Humus provides a congenial home for bacteria, separates the soil particles, serves as a sponge to retain the moisture, provides for air circulation through the soil and is beneficial in many other respects.

With a good humus content, plant growth may be stimulated by the applications of commercial chemical fertilizers. In using such fertilizers, apply them sparingly and frequently. They should be placed on the surface and cultivated in lightly. Fertilizers are available for most any purpose and garden plants will respond quickly when they are used.

It is also highly important that the lawn be fertilized occasionally, and because they contain no weed seeds commercial fertilizers are the best for lawns. Feed the lawn as often as it is necessary to keep it a bright velvety green.

Remember that plants are constantly depleting the soil of nourishment since they must feed, and you can help replenish the food elements by feeding the plants and soil.

Plant asparagus roots six inches deep.  
 In thinning the beets, cook the tops for greens.  
 An occasional dusting with sulphur will be beneficial to green beans.

Beets are one of the most healthful of vegetables, containing more elements which the human system needs than almost any other.

Be sure the dahlia roots you plant have at least one eye—they will not sprout otherwise.

**Ground Squirrel Menace to Farmers Faces Hard Season**  
 Members of the county board of supervisors have appropriated \$5,000 of a \$12,000 fund designed to halt the spread of the ground squirrel menace in 315,000 acres of valuable agricultural land.

Mr. Ground Squirrel will be greeted with a blast of poison gas in his underground chambers in the eradication program to be directed by Lorne S. Neville, chief deputy county horticultural commissioner.

Where it is safe to do so, the county will plant poison grain providing the rodent with a bountiful final feast. When the squirrels are caught out in the open, they will be greeted by volleys from high powered rifles.

The state of California contributes \$1,200 to the extermination program.

**Deceptive Pack Brings Heavy Fine**

## Protest Filed With Road Dept.

Property Owners on Normandie Ask Relief from Mattoon Act Burdens

Petition of Normandie avenue property owners, protesting assessments mounting against their property between Weston avenue and 152nd street, and asking relief, today was being considered by the road committee of the county board of supervisors. The petition, voluminous and bearing the names of several hundred property owners, was filed by Attorney Lloyd Mix, who has been retained by the protestants.

Certain property owners are unable to meet their payments for this improvement, which was installed under the Mattoon Act. By the provisions of the act, the unpaid amounts stand against the other parcels, on which taxes have been paid, which is pointed out, calls for immediate relief. Contention of the Mattoon Act now is before the courts. It is pointed out, and the county is asked to aid the property owners who fear loss of their property.

Improvement of Normandie avenue between Manchester avenue and 114th street will be completed within another month, it was estimated today. John Pappas, contractor who is doing the widening job, has been granted a month's extension by the county supervisors. Winter rains have made progress slow on the improvement, the county road department was informed when the extension was requested.

A protest meeting of property owners will be held tomorrow night at 2026 So. Normandie avenue.

**Business Women to Elect Officers**

At the April business meeting held Monday evening at the Nurses' Home, Mrs. Mary Yonderbe, Mrs. Grace Binger Dean and Mrs. Victoria Olinger were appointed as members of the nominating committee to present a ticket at the annual meeting.

The regular dinner meeting of the club will be held at Earl's Cafe on April 19 with former Senator Charles Lyons as the speaker.

**Appraisers of Real Estate in County Through**  
 New Valuation Is Placed on 425,000 Parcels of Land and Improvements

Revaluation of 1,500,000 parcels of real estate in Los Angeles county, the first general survey since 1917, has been completed and the 80 field deputies who have been working for the past four months will turn in their books to Assessor Ed Hopkins and call it a day.

Immediately upon receipt of the books, scores of clerks in the assessor's office will begin the task of spreading the figures on the tax rolls. This is expected to require about one month.

During the past 120 days the field deputies have actually considered and seen 425,000 parcels of land in the county, Hopkins said. The work was completed inside the \$50,000 appropriation Assessor Hopkins asked for.

Exact total of the new valuation placed on all real estate and improvements in the county cannot be announced until the figures are spread on the books, Hopkins said today.

Last year's total assessed valuation of county real estate was \$1,804,500,195. Valuation of buildings last year was \$964,898,315. This latter figure will be reduced approximately 20 per cent this year, covering every type of building, Hopkins explains.

Nothing has escaped the assessors in their reappraisal, Alexander Dodge, chief appraiser, assured today. Every piece of real estate in the county, whether it be desert or farm land, business or industrial, has had a new valuation fixed upon it.

Appraisers for this revaluation were selected by civil service examination. Every candidate must have had actual experience in appraising land. The appraisers were divided into three classes, those who had four years experience in the last seven years, those who had three years experience in six years and those who had been so employed two years out of the past five.

These men were given map books and visited every block in the county. They checked up on recent sales, lease agreements, subdivision prices, the rentals owners were asking, bank loans, and then exercised their best judgment, Moore explained.
