Last Tuesday the boys laid off spring training long enough to crack the Long Beach Acorns by a score of 10 to 2. The Brown boys pitched, L. Brown for Torrance and R. Brown for the Acorns, but R. Brown failed to last out the circuit and was replaced by Lovejoy in the fifth after Torrance had gained a lead of eight runs. The Acorns' only score came in the seventh when Hyde hit a homer with a man on base. Forney of Torrance also turned in a four-base clout.

Lionel Brown pitched a sweet game for the Bluebirds, which is the Torrance boys' new name, allowing but three hits, whiffing 16 and walking two. The Bluebirds got 11 hits off the Acorns' pitchers, two passes, and only six hit the dust via the whiff route.

Manager Murphy wants to call special attention of the fans next Tuesday night to the pitching of Rudy, the Olive hurler. Spud says, "This fellow Rudy is the cream of the National League pitchers. Not because he beat us 3-2 in our previous encounter, but simply because he's the best."
