Revival Starts Sunday, June 12, at Christian Ch.

Jesse R. Kellams and Evangelistic Party Will Lead Religious Service

The Kellams evangelistic party of New York City, has been secured by the First Christian church, Torrance, to lead in a series of revival services beginning the second Sunday in June. The members of the party are internationally known as spiritual leaders. Jesse R. Kellams, D. D., Ph. D., S. T. D., F. R. G. S., has conducted meetings in the United States, Great Britain, Africa and Australia. During his ministry there have been 50,000 additions to the churches.

Homer F. Kellams has held meetings in the United States and Canada and has served the greatest congregations in the Christian church brotherhood. He is not only a preacher but reported to be one of the finest song leaders in America today. Mrs. Homer Kellams is the chaperone of the party. She draws a beautiful picture each evening which is given to someone at the service. She sings duets with her husband. Mrs. Jesse Kellams is the violinist of the party. She was educated in New York, Paris and Rome and is an artist of great ability. The special meetings will be held in a large tent to be located on Engracia at Arlington avenues, each evening at 7:40 o'clock, excepting Saturday, over a period of three or four weeks.

Building Line Is Established—On Valerie St.

Ordinance to establish a building line on Valerie street, also known as Inglewood-Freeman avenue, between the limits of Torrance boulevard and Huntington street, today was being prepared by the county counsel's office, upon instructions from the board of supervisors. It is expected to be ready for presentation to the supervisors next Monday, when it will be adopted, and 30 days after that date no building may be erected nearer than the distance prescribed from the center line of the street. As Valerie street, which lies between Torrance and Redondo city limits in county territory, is at present a "paper" street, the action of the supervisors is thought to forecast the future extension of Inglewood avenue from the north to connect with either Torrance or Sepulveda boulevard.

Employment Now Improving, Says Business Review

For the first time in many months, employment in California has markedly improved, and April showed an increase of seven per cent over that of March, says the Bank of America's monthly business review. Pay rolls increased 2.4 per cent, but the individual earnings decreased 4.2 per cent. The review called attention to the increased employment in the food group, which showed an increase of 72.3 per cent in employees, and 37.9 per cent in pay rolls. In building permits, the review stated that of the 19 major cities of the state, 11 showed an increase in permits and eight a decrease over the preceding month. Time deposits of all reporting banks of the Twelfth Federal Reserve district have materially increased, and on May 4 had regained all ground lost since February 3. Demand deposits which had increased during each of the first three weeks of April, declined during the last week to new low levels. Total deposits, however, showed a net gain for the period between April 6 and May 4. Over the state, bank debits showed a decrease of 3.01 per cent over March.

Former Officer at Hawthorne Is Named In Suit

Complaint Filed In Superior Court Alleges Failure to Turn Over Funds

Asserting that the former city treasurer of Hawthorne, Mary Luella Wells, refused to turn over \$69,926.76 of city funds to the new city treasurer, the city of Hawthorne has filed a complaint in Los Angeles superior court against the bonding company under which the former official was bonded. The complaint was filed late Friday by City Attorney Guy Lewis. Mrs. Wells was elected on April 9, 1928, the complaint recites, for a four-year term. Bond was executed on her behalf for \$8000 when she took office. Not being re-elected at the last election, she resigned last January 18, it is stated. Joseph S. Mackey, newly-elected city treasurer of Hawthorne, assumed his office on January 22, and made demands upon Mrs. Wells for certain public moneys which have not been turned over, it is alleged. The \$69,926 includes general funds, water works operating fund, municipal water works fund, water works bonds, 1911 bond fund, 1915 street bond redemption fund and acquisition and improvement district funds. The action instituted against the bonding company, the American Surety Company, seeks to recover the former treasurer's \$8000 bond, which will have the effect of causing the bonding company to induce their client to turn over the money.
