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
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### Mexico Completing Links In International Highway

enough to warrant canning. The fruit should be uniformly ripe and sound for a good quality product. The flavor and color of canned berries is greatly improved if a syrup is made of sugar and berry juice which is obtained by crushing, heating and straining the imperfect berries. For this syrup use 3 1/2 lbs. sugar to one gallon water and berry juice. Fill jars full of fruit and cover with hot syrup, then process—Hot pack: Water bath, 8 minutes; over 45 minutes at 250° F.; pressure cooker, 10 minutes at 5 lbs., or you may use the open kettle method. Cook small quantities of fruit at a time in the syrup, place in jars and fill to overflowing; put rubbers on and screw covers tight.
