10-Point Plan For Counties to Reduce Taxation

Head of State Association Recommends Means of Cutting Down Costs

SACRAMENTO.—(U.P.)—A 10-point program for adoption by Los Angeles county and every other county in California where property is overburdened by taxation has been recommended by Dr. Milbank Johnson, chairman of the board of directors of the California Taxpayers' Association.

"Our 6 years of experience convinces us that the time has come to take stock of our county government, examine the needs of our counties, measure their costs, and discover the leaks and inefficiencies in their present structure and operation," he said.

Under the present system of county government in California there is no chief administrative officer to direct the proper coordination of county functions. Dr. Johnson pointed out. This, he said, greatly decreases efficiency. County supervisors, who controlled more than half the total tax rate in 1913, now control less than a third.

Dr. Milbank's program for cutting county costs follows:
1. Study the possibility of reducing the number of counties. Originally there were 27; now there are 58. Consolidations would improve services and save expenditures.

2. Plug the leaks in county purchasing. Only 22 of the 58 counties in California centralize purchases under a county agent.

3. Abolish nepotism, or the employment of relatives, by county officers as their deputies and substitutes. This is a matter for the state legislature.

4. Adopt a county unit system of administration. It would save millions of dollars for the taxpayers and provide a better highway system for the counties.

5. Curb the wastes and extravagances in the present method of administering public welfare. County hospitals are better equipped than private hospitals and are easily accessible to those who try to get in.

6. Examine the law enforcement branch of county government, and provide for more efficient administration of courts.

7. Eliminate the payment of county officials on the fee basis. Fees, fines and other income should be deposited with the county treasurer to the credit of the county.

8. Establish control over school budgets. Reorganize school districts into larger units, with the power of revising school budgets in the hands of an appeal board.

9. Define and prescribe local financial procedure. This must be done by the state, and should include local use of budgets, proper accounts, adequate audits, and regulation.
