

Torrance Eleventh In Value of May Building Permits

Torrance was numbered among the first 12 cities in California in value of building permits for May, 1932. Its total for the month was \$86,800, which exceeded by a large amount the permits of May, 1931. This figure, while gratifying, is somewhat deceptive so far as the actual picture of building conditions here is concerned, as the \$86,800 covers the erection of the Fern avenue school at \$84,000, and one or two smaller buildings making up the balance.

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Rowing Events to Be Held At Long Beach In August

Only a few miles from here in the city of Long Beach, preparations are going ahead for one of the major features of the Olympic Games, the 16-day series of sports events, which will be held July 30 to August 14.

The neighboring beach city is making ready for the rowing attractions of the Olympics. Fifty nations have announced they will send 2000 men and women athletes to Southern California. For the games, and of that number more than a score have signified they will take part in the rowing competitions.

The course, from start to finish, is visible from any spot along the banks. It is 1 1/2 miles in length, deep enough for a battleship and as straight as the art of engineering can produce.

World Traveler Talks to Scouts Here Friday Nite
