Rate of Speed Governs Safety Following Car

Engineer Compiles Table of Distances Required for Stop to Avoid Wreck

How closely behind another car may one drive and yet enjoy a feeling of security from accident?

The question has much more than mere academic interest at this season when highways in all parts of the country are thronged with motorists desirous of getting somewhere and extremely anxious to do so with complete safety. The answer is contained in a bulletin received by the National Automobile Club from the American Road Builders' Association, whose engineers have based their calculations upon a single ten-foot lane of pavement.

These experts point out that at a speed of 60 miles an hour the driver should leave a distance of 233 feet between himself and the car ahead. Such an allowance precludes, of course, conditions that prohibit pulling out of a single lane and passing the car ahead. This situation is encountered only at peak traffic loads, but it is one that the average motorist should be prepared in advance to meet.

Following are considered the safe margins between vehicles traveling in a single lane at various speeds: Thirty miles an hour, 71 feet; 35 miles, 90 feet; 40 miles, 113 feet; 45 miles, 138 feet; 50 miles, 167 feet; 55 miles, 193 feet; 60 miles, 233 feet.

If the motor vehicle operator protests that such a stopping distance allowance on city streets would hopelessly reduce traffic capacity, it is explained that these are distances based upon travel in a single traffic lane. That he is able to proceed with comparative safety with a smaller margin, than, say, the 71 feet specified at a speed of 30 miles an hour, is because street width enables him to change traffic lanes. Where such flexibility is not permitted, allowance of the stopping margins specified in the table is his reasonable assurance against rear-end collision.

Establish New County Welfare Office San Pedro

The southern district of the county welfare department will be divided into two separate districts effective July 1. Supervisor Frank L. Shaw announced Monday. On and after that date, the Long Beach office will deal only with Long Beach cases, Shaw said. San Pedro and the harbor district will have its own office, in the building of the water and power department of the city of Los Angeles. This building now is being renovated suitable to the needs of the welfare office, at no cost to the county. The load being carried by the Long Beach office is becoming heavier, Supervisor Shaw said, and now varies between 2500 and 3000 cases. Rental on the new San Pedro office will be \$70 a month, and the county will enter into a three-year lease, effective July 6.

Oil Industry to Benefit By Paving

Pointing out that the oil industry, in Torrance and all other sections of the county, would be aided, the Wilmington Chamber of Commerce has asked the county board of supervisors to give preference to "black pavement" whenever possible. A similar request was made of the Los Angeles city council.

In the communication, signed by Secretary G. H. Moore, pointed out asserted advantages of the black pavement, one of the principal ones being that it is ready for use immediately after laying.
