Observe Rules If You Want to Enjoy Motoring

Hints to Vacationists Promise Safety and Satisfaction If Followed

SACRAMENTO.—(U.P.)—California motorists will have a much better chance of enjoying their vacations if they observe a few common sense rules of the road.

Records of the California highway patrol shows that a large proportion of automobile accidents occur in the summer months when vacation travel is at its heaviest. Many of the accidents, the case records indicate, could have been avoided had the proper preliminary preparations been made.

Because of this the patrol has prepared a few "hints" to be followed by the vacation motorist. Here they are:

- 1. You will enjoy your trip more by proceeding leisurely. 2. Have good tires on your car and check them frequently. Don't over-inflate them. See that your brakes are adequate to control your car. 3. Check the windshield wiper for safety. You may run into a storm and need it. 4. Do not try to drive too far any one day. It is unsafe to drive when the eyes become tired and the body fatigued. 5. Keep to the RIGHT at all times. 6. Load your baggage so it does not protrude beyond the running board on the left hand side, nor more than six inches beyond the running board on the right side. Do not carry spare tires in front of the radiator. 7. If you smoke, carry some sort of container for lighted matches, cigars or cigarettes. You may start a serious fire by throwing them out and you may be arrested. 8. In listing these suggestions, officials of the patrol pointed out that the motorist is, of course, expected to obey the recognized traffic laws in addition to these precautions. It also was pointed out that it is much more satisfactory to travel "light" inasmuch as a car loaded too heavily is inclined to take much of the joy out of vacations by developing ailments at the most unfortunate time.

Graduates Are Handicapped, Says Director

Only 30 Per Cent of This Year's Classes May Expect Employment

SACRAMENTO.—(U.P.)—Only 30 per cent of the high school graduates of Los Angeles county this year may expect employment and the remaining 70 per cent probably will have to seek additional training in the opinion of state department of education officials.

As the result of this condition which is general throughout the state it was pointed out that school authorities must plan now for the expansion of the junior college system to permit education to keep in step with the rapidly advancing demands of industry.

It is estimated that of the 30 per cent of high school graduates which industry will absorb within six months, the majority will be girls. Many will marry or remain at home, but the girl graduate has the obvious advantage because more office and merchandising jobs are open to her than to boys of equal school training, it was claimed.

"Youth in many of our small cities and in agricultural areas today are handicapped because the moment they step from the high school door," the director said. "Their high school diplomas no longer will be acceptable as passports to the vocations they would like to follow, and in which there may be greater opportunity for employment.

"Materially higher costs of college training place them at a disadvantage with youths residing in cities where vocational or university facilities are available. This is in discordance with the general tone of democracy which California wants in its public school system."

Continued from Page 1 funds set aside in the contingent fund. He estimated that the lighting bill could be reduced by \$2500. He proposed that Assistant Engineer Herb Summer be put on a four-day basis, with a savings of \$480 a year. He also expressed the opinion that reductions could be made in the police and street department equipment expense. Klusman and Ludlow advocated abolishing the printing of the council proceedings.

When Councilman Steiner and Wright expressed the opinion that the 80-cent rate was not sufficient to carry out the necessary requirements of the city, including the aid of the unemployed and proposed an 85-cent rate, Ludlow predicted that he would be able to provide as much money for the unemployed as the last council had and would still have a substantial sum left toward retiring the \$60,000 deficit. Wright claimed that a 90-cent increase in the rate would not increase the tax bill due to the 30 per cent cut in valuations.

Same Problem Last Year The 12-cent increase in the proposed tax rate was explained by members of the new council as being due to the fact that the city was expected to reduce the city's assessed valuation approximately \$4,000,000. However, the old council experienced a similar situation last year when valuations were reduced by nearly two million between 1930 and 1931. It was also necessary to raise \$17,808 last year to pay accumulated assessments on the Metropolitan Water District and another \$5000 for attorneys' fees in connection with the municipal water bond election, of which the tax bill due to the new council's budget, except for \$2750 to be paid the city's attorneys in the water bond suit.

On recommendation of Councilman Ludlow, the council voted to have the city's books kept on a cash receipts and disbursements basis beginning July 1 this year.

Zinnias for the Olympic Games

In an effort to have a great display of colorful flowers for the Olympic games visitors on the Pacific coast this summer, the Zinnia is to be planted extensively.

Woman's clubs and civic organizations are sponsoring a movement to such an extent that the Pacific coast will probably bloom this summer as it has never done before, and with the fine rains which we have had this spring, the floral display should be outstandingly beautiful. Public-spirited citizens may co-operate by planting bold colors of Zinnias to help enliven the scene with these brilliant colors.

The large flowers of Zinnias include Dahlia-flowered, California Giants, and the Grandiflora Robusta or Giant Double; medium-flowering types are Zinnia Elegans and Zinnia Jumilla. These names refer to types and there are varieties in various colors in each type.

The Zinnia of today is a very high-class flower, remarkably improved through hybridizing and selecting. For good germination of Zinnia seeds, they must be sown in warm soil, for if the soil is cold the seeds may decay. They may be started early in flats or beds where they are protected from the cold but should be transplanted to the open ground before the plants become too large. Sowings may be made in the open ground in the late spring and early summer with very good results.

In freshly turned moist soil place the seeds to a depth of one-half to one inch, and avoid sprinkling, for this may crust the surface and result in poor germination. The large-flowering Zinnias may be used very effectively as a background and the Lilliput Zinnias placed in the foreground. The Lilliputs are similar in form to the Pompon Dahlias.
