## Olympic Pins Are On Sale Locally

Urging every citizen to wear an official Olympic pin from now until the Olympic Games are over on August 14, Gov. James Rolph, Jr., honorary member of the American Olympic committee, California division, today pointed out the necessity for assuring a great American team in the Olympic fields this summer.

The pins, selling at 50 cents each, are the only means being used to raise the California share of the national funds required to train, equip and bring the American athletes to Los Angeles on July 29. Teams of other nations already have begun to arrive on the scene, and in most cases they appear stronger than in previous Olympiads. The strength and efficiency of the American athletes who compete with them will depend upon the enthusiasm with which the public helps to finance them, Gov. Rolph declared.

## Stranded Barge Is Towed Out to Sea

Efforts to tow out to sea the fishing barge "Thos. F. Emigh," which went ashore at Redondo Beach during a recent storm, were successful Sunday afternoon, after a long battle. Heavy pumps had cleared the hold of water to lighten the ship enough to raise it from the sand. First attempts to pull the boat off shore were somewhat disappointing as the ship filled with water immediately as soon as it was dragged free of the shore, and sank to the deck level. A ten-ton tractor which had been used to aid in the salvage was pulled into the breakers.
