



Low Wage Scale Is Not Intended To Be Standard

County Charities Bureau Establishes 30-cent Rate to Provide More Work

The 30-cent wage scale established by the county charities department was not intended to be a standard wage scale, it was pointed out today by the county bureau of efficiency in answer to numerous letters of protest received by the board of supervisors. Union labor groups and civic bodies in Bell, Huntington Park, Lynwood and other east side organizations have protested the 30-cent wage, pointing out that it was setting an example for industry.

"Los Angeles county is not attempting to provide competitive employment by providing work for heads of families and paying them at the rate of 30 cents an hour, but simply and solely to give relief to those in need," the bureau's report states.

"It was felt that the rate of pay must not be high enough to make the recipient of county aid contented and cause him to make no effort to improve his condition. Therefore, the 30 cents an hour was decided upon. However, each man is permitted to work only long enough each month to earn money equal to the value of the budget to which he is entitled, which depends upon the size of his family. If paid at a higher rate, they would not be permitted to receive any more money than their budgets provide, and therefore would work fewer days each month."

"We believe that the longer these men are gainfully employed each month the longer they will be kept away from harmful influences, and that both they and the community will be better off."
