Evangelistic Meetings Will Close Friday

Five Weeks of Successful Revival Work Comes to An End in Torrance

One of the most successful evangelistic meetings ever held in Torrance is in its closing days at the big tent of the First Christian church at the corner of Engracia and Arlington streets. This will complete five weeks of services during which audiences have packed the tent every single night, and almost a hundred men and women have been added to the membership of the local Christian church.

It was because of their friendship for Dr. George Elder, pastor of the church here, that the Kellems party came to Torrance, and this friendship has proven a splendid thing for our city.

In his closing messages this week, Dr. Jesse R. Kellems is preaching masterful addresses upon scriptural subjects, showing the deadliness of sin and the way of escape from its consequences.

Thursday night, Dr. Kellems speaks on the rather unusual theme, "The Ape and the Tiger," and Friday night on the question, "Can a Man Be Saved Outside the Church?"

Dr. Kellems will speak to the men at the men's class at the theatre at 8:30 Sunday morning, and at the 11 o'clock hour will deliver a message directly applicable to the many new members, who will be guests of honor and occupy the center section of the tent.

Each new member is to wear a red carnation which is to be furnished through the kindness of the Poppy Flower Shop, 1400 Cravens street.

Interesting features of Thursday and Friday night's services will be the showing of the pictures of Dr. Kellems' big game hunts in South Africa. Among these will be photographs of the six-ton elephant he shot in self defense as the animal was rushing him, and was only five yards away. Undoubtedly by the big tent will be packed beyond capacity these three closing nights, as well as for the Sunday morning service.

Citizens Asked to Contribute to Olympic Expense

"Citizens of California must immediately contribute to the national fund to defray expenses of the American Olympic team if this country is to have an opportunity for the first time in its history to win the Olympic Games on her own soil!"

This is the declaration made today by Avery Brundage, national president of the American Olympic committee, the organization which is raising \$350,000 to pay all expenses of training, equipping and bringing the big American Olympic team here for the Games, opening July 30.

"Already foreign teams, well-trained and eager for the Games to start, are quartered in Olympic Village, Los Angeles. But the American team will not be selected until July 15 and 16 in Palo Alto, and very little progress has been made toward securing the necessary funds to pay their expenses."

The California fund is being raised through the sale of official fifty-cent Olympic pins, the sale means open to the citizens of this state to contribute to the success of the American athletes. There will be 600 members of the American Olympic track and field team, and many athletes, coaches and trainers, as well as transportation to be paid. With the opening date of the Games rapidly approaching it becomes more and more important that this state not only raise its quota through the purchase of the pins, but exceed it.

Mr. Brundage declared. The pins may be purchased at any Safeway or Piggly Wiggly store in California.

Survey Route of Highway Over San Gabriel Mts.

Direct Outlet to the North Is Provided by Proposed Road Thru Arroyo Seco

Delay in forwarding the county's \$101,448 allocation to finance the extension of Figueroa street from 18th to 153rd street will undoubtedly prevent award of the contract until later. It was learned from the Los Angeles board of public works.

Meanwhile, plans were progressing for the extension of North Figueroa street, formerly Annandale boulevard, from Colorado street to Michigan boulevard in La Canada. County Surveyor J. E. Rockhold has been authorized to make a final and complete survey of the route of the new highway over the San Gabriel mountains, preparatory to acquisition of right-of-way.

North Figueroa street is the new name of the artery formerly known as Pasadena avenue and Annandale road. Extension of the artery over the mountains to Antelope valley is feasible, the surveyor's office reported recently after a preliminary check. Only the financing of the project now remains to be worked out to provide a new outlet into Los Angeles from the north.

White plans are under way to provide this new direct outlet to the north, efforts are being made to obtain right-of-way for the connection of Figueroa street below 190th street with Main street, thus providing a through artery from the Mojave desert and Antelope valley on the north through the San Gabriel mountains, connecting with the new mountain highway through the Arroyo Seco and crossing the hills west of the Annandale country club, entering Los Angeles through the recently-opened triple tunnels, and extending south to the harbor.

Patent Concrete Mixer Said to Be Unemployment Cause

Use of Transit-mixed cement concrete, a product of the Consolidated Rock Products Company, operators of extensive plants in San Fernando valley and various parts of Los Angeles, seriously aggravates unemployment, the county board of supervisors was told today by the Los Angeles building trades council.

"Use of this product, which is an innovation in and around Los Angeles, eliminates men who otherwise would be hired to shovel sand and gravel and cement into concrete mixers on the job," the letter of protest, signed by Sollius Hardin, secretary, read.

By this process, the proper proportions of sand, gravel and cement are dumped into a mixer on a special truck at the company's plant and the truck starts for its destination, while the mixing process proceeds en route by a small engine on the truck.
