Fast Drivers Save Seconds, Increase Accident Hazards

Less Than Half An Hour Gained At Fifty On 200-Mile Trip

The fallacy of fast driving as a time saver was demonstrated here today in figures released by E. Raymond Cato, chief of the California Highway Patrol. Cato pointed out that the time gained in driving at the rate of 50 miles an hour instead of the legal rate of 45 miles is but eight seconds per mile. On the other hand the hazard of accident is increased many times as the stopping distance required to brake a vehicle going at 50 miles an hour instead of 45 is increased 27 feet. The saving in time for an average trip of 200 miles was computed at only a little more than 37 minutes.

As another example, the highway patrol chief said that a man who travels from Los Angeles to Sacramento at 50 miles an hour will arrive only 58 minutes ahead of the driver who travels at 45 miles an hour and his chances of an accident will be infinitely greater. "The moral of this is to drive at a legal rate of speed," Cato said. "Our records of accidents show most of those involving death occur at high speeds."

Drivers traveling at 20 miles an hour who increase this speed to 25 will save 36 seconds in a mile. On the other hand this increase of five miles an hour means an increase in stopping distance for two-wheel brake cars of from 37 to 58 feet and an increase in the stopping distance for four-wheel brakes of from 22.2 feet to 34.7 feet. Cato's computations show it takes 139 feet to stop a car with four-wheel brakes going at 50 miles an hour and 112.8 feet to stop the same car going at 45 miles an hour. It takes 232 feet to stop a car with two-wheel brakes going at 50 miles an hour. Cars going at this rate travel 73.3 feet per second.

Parachute Show to Demonstrate New Apparatus

As the principal feature of a parachute show at the Los Angeles airport next Sunday afternoon, July 17, the newly-invented Trusty life-saving device for transport airplanes will be given its premier public demonstration. It is announced by Col. R. B. Barnitz, named by the Trusty as its chief instructor, to be a benefit affair for the Los Angeles Axiators' Post of the American Legion.

The Trusty aeronautical life-saver is the invention of Harry P. Trusty, disabled World War veteran, who adds this to a long list of inventions which he has made in the practice of his profession as a designing engineer. The device consists, according to Trusty, of an arrangement for swinging airplane passengers, still in their chairs, out through emergency doors in the sides of the ship, then dropping them, chairs and all, automatically from davits, pulling away 30-foot parachutes from their packs under the plane as they fall.

Preliminary tests of the invention made last week in the presence of United States Department of Commerce officials indicate its entire practicability.

County Asked to Abate Nuisance of Burning Peat Beds

Residents in Baldwin Hills District Complain of Gas and Smoke

Steps are being taken today by Los Angeles county to eliminate the burning peat beds on the Anita Baldwin property at the foot of the Baldwin Hills, with allocation of \$10,000 by the board of supervisors in special session this week. And, when the bill has been completed, the bill for labor and material probably will be sent to Anita Baldwin.

Tired of the procrastination following their recent order to the district attorney's office nearly three weeks ago, and harassed by telephone calls of residents who complained that their health was being endangered, the board called together at a special session Tuesday by Supervisors Frank L. Shaw and John R. Quinn. It is in these two supervisory districts that the peat beds are located and where residents are affected.

Deputies from Buron Fitts' office reported, "We have been unable to locate the owner of the property." Shaw then moved for a special appropriation of \$10,000 to pay the cost of the work, and asked that the county's chief mechanical engineer, William Davidson, be instructed to suppress the gaseous fumes at the earliest moment. The motion was carried unanimously.

At the same time, the opinion of County Counsel Everett W. Mattoon was asked as to whether or not the county could not collect the amount expended from Anita Baldwin, owner of the land, and whom the district attorney's deputies said they were unable to locate. The opinion will be given the supervisors shortly.

Not to be overlooked is the possible danger to the health of athletes in Olympic Village, here to participate in the Olympic Games which open in two weeks and will last for approximately two weeks.

Consolidation of Health Depts. Will Save Money

City and County Bureaus Now Maintain Overlapping Service

Probability that consolidation of Los Angeles city and county health departments will be effected shortly, at a saving of approximately \$500,000 annually to the city of Los Angeles and reduction in part of the county department's expense, was seen today with introduction of a resolution in the metropolitan city council by Councilman Thomas F. Ford. The resolution was referred to the health and sanitation committee and county affairs committee jointly.

"Economic stress of these times is making this overlapping function of government burdensome to the taxpayer," Ford said. "The estimate of the bureau of efficiency states that consolidation of the city and county health departments would effect a saving of approximately \$500,000 annually. Indications are that the city's budget revenues will be \$1,000,000 under the estimated revenue, especially aid the city. We ask that the Los Angeles city council take immediate steps to effect this consolidation within the next 30 days."

Meanwhile, advocates of economical government were urging further consolidations of overlapping city and county departments. One of the first consolidations, it is pointed out, was the meat inspection service. The city turned its work over to the county, and the county on July 1 turned both over to the state.

Duplicate and triplicate dairy inspection has been the subject of considerable criticism, but this has been relieved in a number of instances. However, Pasadena for instance has its own dairy inspectors, and efforts are being made to eliminate further duplication.

"Clean-up" Man In Epidemic of Early Days Retires

J. H. Griffin, who for some 20 years operated a feed store in Gardena, has retired to the peace and quiet of Hollywood to spend the remainder of his days with his daughter, Mrs. Bernice Taylor, 1216 South Curson avenue. Griffin will be 82 years old in October.

Griffin, well known in the Gardena community, recalls the boom days of Goldfield, Nevada, vividly. For he was sanitary inspector there for some years. He came to the rough and ready town in 1903, from Reno, Nevada. He was one of the first to see the epidemic broke out, and inhabitants of the boom town died off at the rate of 15 to 20 daily.

Something had to be done to literally "clean up the town," and Griffin was named for the job. He was named sanitary inspector, armed and vested with the power of a deputy sheriff, and with a shovel brigade he set out to do his work. Piles of garbage and refuse three feet high were moved from alleys and back yards. He remembers it not as a likeable job, but the spread of the epidemic was checked.
