he hoped the council would see fit to raise Stevenson's salary and let him move out, as it certainly was not a pleasant place to live over the jail.

Steiner Explains. Councilman Steiner said he believed the decision of the police committee was right, because it had been submitted certain charges backed by affidavits of reputable citizens. "I don't believe we should take the unsupported word of an official against the sworn statements of a number of citizens."

In the three months that this council has been meeting, Mayor Klusman has never consulted me on city matters, nor has he brought one constructive proposition before this meeting. I have served three years on this board and have never missed a meeting and surely I could have helped the mayor," said Steiner.

The veteran councilman added that he hoped the council would get down to business, and said that if it can't get along pleasantly, that the only time he would sit at this table is when he had something to bring up concerning his department.

Open to Public. On motion of Councilman Wright the council instructed the city clerk to keep the Stevenson and Wright charges with their supporting affidavits open to public inspection for 10 days, and then to file them away. Mayor Klusman voted the only negative vote to the motion.

Recall Threatened. Threats of a recall were made by D. A. Leatherman, who spoke from the audience. Leatherman said he was a member of a committee to recall three members of the council and warned that if the council did not get down to business and act like men instead of school children, that the committee would act.

Mr. Leatherman did not mention which three councilmen his committee intended to recall, but reports on the street state that the list is aimed at Ludlow, Steiner and Wright.

Councilman Wright got in the last word by asking, "Isn't it customary for the mayor to ask the council to co-operate," stating that he had never been consulted on city affairs by the mayor, and that the controversies launched by Klusman at the council meetings "came out of a clear sky."

Pandemics of the Past. Even with depression, even with the memory of a great war and the always present talk of poison gas and mechanical destruction from the air, we live today in comparative security.

In 1348, in Europe, an unseen enemy that travelled swiftly from the Orient dealt death to half of Europe. It was not a battle whose strategic moves, charges and counter-charges, defeats and victories, have been minutely described in the histories of the nations. In one world history only six lines of small type are devoted to this wholesale massacre of 25,000,000 persons who were killed regardless of sex, age or creed.

The Black Death which swept unrestricted, through Europe, upset political and economic concepts of that day. Fields remained unplowed, the peasants dying like flies; industry was idle, its workers dropping dead on the cobblestone streets.

This fearful foe from the Orient that threatened to wipe out western civilization was an unseen germ, the germ of the bubonic plague, Marco Polo possibly set the stage for this tremendous spectacle of death when he wrote his book of travels through China and Tartary. His writing spurred others to travel. Masses of people passed back and forth, and so probably carried the bubonic germ.

The bubonic germ and others are as potent for wholesale destruction of human life today as in the day of Marco Polo. But, medical science has discovered a way to combat them. Epidemics today are short-lived. Persons stricken with a communicable disease are isolated, and those not yet stricken are easily made safe by immunization.

Medical science has been instrumental in making immunization available to every man, woman and child in the United States. An intelligent understanding is all that medical science asks in return. "Every man has a bit of tuberculosis." This is an old saying in medicine. While it may not be strictly true, it has a great deal of truth in it. Many persons have shown foot of tuberculosis after death that were not demonstrable in life, and many who while living had signs of this disease never died from it.

In these individuals the body has won a successful battle against it. Quite often areas of tuberculosis are found in the lung surrounded by a dense layer of fibrous tissue that walls off this area from the rest of the body. These may be called cases of "healed tuberculosis."

Intelligent handling of tuberculosis in recent years has done much to restrain this grave menace, but tuberculosis is far from being conquered. Those who are battling with this enemy need the intelligent support of every one so that suspected cases may receive immediate medical attention. The more the public knows about tuberculosis the better it will be able to cope with it.

Tuberculosis is curable—by a trained doctor of medicine. To attempt self-diagnosis and then to trust to self-treatment may readily prove fatal. It is always well to remember that a bottle with an attractive label cannot render a diagnosis of anything. And, no patent medicine has ever cured "diseased lungs."

Statistics prove that 85 per cent of early cases of tuberculosis get well when they are diagnosed and

Cuts In Salaries Will Not Produce Reduction In Tax

Taxpayers Can Not Force Lowering of Pay to Statutory Officers

SACRAMENTO.—(U.P.)—Taxpayers of California counties cannot force the reduction of salaries paid to statutory officers by means of threats, nor can taxes be reduced materially by salary reductions in the opinion of Attorney General U. S. Webb.

The opinion, given to Erling S. Norby, district attorney of Yuba county, is applicable to every county in the state at this time when every effort is being made to reduce governmental expenses. The question of threats was brought up in connection with an alleged statement by a "taxpayer's league" that they would make the future election of officials "uncertain" unless they took a voluntary salary reduction.

"By the great weight of authority," Webb said, "agreements by a public officer to accept a salary less than that provided by law for the office are against public policy and void."

"Such agreement made pursuant to a threat might subject the officer to penal liability. The threat, if carried into effect, also might violate the penal code." While new budgets must include statutory salaries in full, Webb pointed out that officials could make voluntary contributions to county treasuries just as any other person could. Referring to general governmental conditions, Webb said:

"Though the present stifling industrial depression broke as early as October, 1929, no effort to cut government extravagancies or to reduce the cost of government to actual necessities seems to have been considered until surplusage had been completely exhausted and tremendous deficits incurred."

"Where salaries are too high, reductions should be made, but the largest reduction even the elimination of all salaries if possible, would not alone go far in accomplishing the relief that must be given."

In keeping with this view it was pointed out that in many counties a reduction of 25 per cent in salaries would only cut the tax rate approximately five cents on the dollar.

Referring again to the proper method of reducing salaries, if necessary, Webb declared that the governor "could call a special session of the legislature for readjustment of state and county salaries over which it has control subject to constitutional limitations."
