Harbor District Chambers of Com. Meet at Harbor City

The Harbor District Chambers of Commerce are meeting today at the Chamber of Commerce hall in the postoffice building at Harbor City. The place of meeting was first announced as Hermosa Beach, but later was changed. The committee meetings will be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon, with delegate business meeting at 5 o'clock.

Funds Voted For Riv.-Red. Blvd.; Widening Work

Allocation of \$1537 for the improvement of Riverside-Redondo boulevard from Vermont avenue westerly to the city limits, in the city of Gardena, was made this week by the county board of supervisors.

The work to be done is addition of two-inch rock and all shoulders on either side of the artery. The allocation is to be used to purchase materials, labor and for engineering services.

Thatcher Kemp Opens Campaign For Dist. Atty.

That failure to investigate a number of investment companies before their liquidation had cost the people of Southern California millions of dollars was the charge of Thatcher J. Kemp, candidate for District Attorney for Los Angeles county, as he opened his campaign.

"Crooks do not continue stealing when they know they are being watched. Why has not the robbery of these thousands of people been stopped long before it has ended in bankruptcy, disgrace and disaster, with nothing left for the investors?" he asked 700 enthusiastic supporters gathered at the Biltmore ballroom.

Promising to definitely cut needless expenses in the district attorney's office, by eliminating the employment of extra counsel to try important cases, by reduction of the investigators department, by making the grand jury less needed through filing of complaints by his own office, Mr. Kemp said he would do his part in solving the excessive tax problem.

Supervisors' Bonds Are Raised \$30,000

Los Angeles county supervisors who are elected in November must post a bond of \$50,000, according to a decision of judges of the superior court.

Heretofore, the bond was fixed at \$20,000. The boost of \$30,000 was not explained by the judges sitting in council this week.

Premium on the bonds is paid by the county treasury, which means the bonding companies are to be paid a higher fee. Responsibility of fixing the bonds rests with the judges.
