Elaborate Plans For Developing Alondra Park Prepared By County

Around the Council Table

Complete topographic and grading plans have been drawn for Alondra Park by skilled draftsmen given part-time work in the county regional planning commission offices, with funds provided by the county employes' unemployment relief fund. It was stated today by Charles S. Diggs, director. This is the park, located north of Riverside-Redondo boulevard, between Prairie and Cypress avenues, which a group of taxpayers has recently asked the board of supervisors to hold in abeyance.

A perspective of the 319-acre park development as proposed, together with plans, elevations and perspectives of four buildings, also was drawn by the firm. Three men, all qualified professional men out of employment temporarily, were assigned to do this work on Alondra park under the direction of Werner Ruchti, landscape design engineer. Two of these were employed for three months and one for approximately two months, doing work on four other county park projects as well as Alondra park. The work they have done, according to Director Diggs, would have required salaries of more than average pay-ment in ordinary times.

Projects undertaken by the regional planning office, using money from the 2 per cent relief fund, included in addition to park layout design, traffic surveys, an industrial survey, and preparation of numerous maps from which future work will in many instances be based. Wages totaling \$15,588 were paid, which represents savings of \$57,300 for the work performed, meaning that it would have cost the commission approximately \$100,000 had the work been done in normal times, according to Director Diggs.

School Budgets Higher In City and J. C. Dist.

L. A. System and Compton Junior College Ask For More Money

Compton Junior College is the only district in the county to put in a school budget larger than asked for 1931-32. It was revealed today in a check of the various estimates filed by the five junior college districts, more than a dozen high school districts, and several score elementary school districts.

Comparison of the figures shows that Compton Junior College asks for a total budget of \$110,371 as compared with \$118,089 for 1931-32. Only approximately \$900 of this amount is for increased salaries, being \$75,934 this year as compared with \$66,876 last year.

Los Angeles city school system, serving Torrance, leads all high school districts with \$14,988,065 for 1932-33 as compared with \$13,250,182 for last year. Long Beach is second with a \$2,032,187 budget for this year, against \$2,636,157 last year.

Rescind Action In Improvement of 254th Street

Proceedings for the improvement of 254th street from Belle Porte to the west city boundary of the shoeing addition, were rescinded by the Los Angeles city council this week on recommendation of its public works committee.

Quinn Advocates National Training Civil Service School

Supervisor John R. Quinn in a broadcast from the city hall radio station, advocated the founding of a national civil service training school with federal aid where students would be instructed and trained exclusively for positions in government service.

The supervisor outlined a plan to finance such a school and declared, "Just as soon as I can get the sentiment toward such a school as I have in mind it is my purpose to consult the national administration regarding it. I thoroughly believe that it is high time something is done to create a genuine desire for a career in the public service on the part of those already in the service as well as on the part of those who are contemplating entering it."
