


### Daniel Beecher Has Long Record of Achievements

### Buron Fitts Is Basing Campaign Solely On Record

### Group of Attorneys Point Out Economy and Efficiency Of Prosecutor

District Attorney Buron Fitts, who is a candidate for re-election, is basing his campaign solely upon the record of his office during the last three and one-half years.

At a recent luncheon of 1,000 lawyers of Los Angeles county who are sponsoring Mr. Fitts' candidacy, the fact was stressed that among those who are seeking to succeed Mr. Fitts are several able lawyers and splendid citizens, but that not one of them has had any experience as a prosecutor.

The fact was further stressed that the group of lawyers with whom Mr. Fitts has surrounded himself is admittedly the finest aggregation of legal talent ever brought together in any prosecuting office in the United States. Furthermore, should District Attorney Buron Fitts be defeated in this election, this corps of experienced and tested public officials might be torn asunder and supplanted by inexperienced and untrained appointees chosen by his successor.

During these three and one-half years Mr. Fitts and his able assistants have prosecuted 11,316 felony cases. Of this number 11,063 convictions were had, or a total of 74% successful convictions. The best previous average under former district attorneys was 59% successful convictions. In New York City during the same period only 4,004 successful convictions were had, out of a total of 19,984 cases prosecuted or 21% successful convictions. In Chicago 12,543 cases were prosecuted, with only 594 convictions, or a total of 4% successful convictions.

Such leading members of the bar as Joe Scott, Judge Benjamin F. Bledsoe, Henry G. Bodkin, Judge Robert M. Clarke, John D. Fredericks, Judge Frank G. Finlayson, and Louis W. Myers, advocating Mr. Fitts' re-election, point out the fact that he is as lenient and considerate in handling first offenders as he is determined and relentless against organized crime. They point to the fact that out of 11,063 successful convictions had under his administration, only 35 cases have been reversed by the higher courts.

Pointing to Mr. Fitts' record of economy, attention is called to the fact that when he took office each felony conviction cost the taxpayer of Los Angeles county \$281.43. This cost has now been reduced to \$173.12, or an actual saving to the taxpayer of 38%.
