DRESSING UP YOUR SALADS!

Salad making is truly one of the ARTS and every up-to-date homemaker welcomes suggestions and ideas which will aid her in adding to her repertoire of favorite salads.

Dressings play a large part in the flavor and appearance of every salad and this is, in reality, what makes many an otherwise uninteresting mixture of greens, vegetables or fruits, a delicious salad.

There was a time when a boiled dressing was very generally used for every salad. Then mayonnaise was considered quite the thing for all salads. As the general use of a wider variety of vegetables in salads increased, French dressing became popular, showing that the present mode is toward this type of dressing, though mayonnaise still holds its place.

Salads are made of so many different ingredients that it is impossible to use the same kind of dressing for all of them and, naturally, as the popularity and variety of salads has increased, it has called forth a greater variety in dressings, based upon one of the three old stand-bys.

These suggestions will help in the selection of the dressing for

salad used in everyday menus and for entertaining.

When to Use Various Types of Salad Dressing

1. Plain French dressing is used with fresh salad greens, vegetable salads, fish salads, fruit salads, and cheese salads.
2. French dressing with condiments is used with fresh salad greens, cold fish or shellfish.
3. Plain mayonnaise is used with fish and shellfish salads, vegetable salads and meat salads.
4. Whipped cream mayonnaise is used with fruit salads.
5. Mayonnaise with condiments is used with fish and shellfish dishes, succulent vegetables as cucumbers, tomatoes and celery, cream cheese and nut salads.
6. Boiled dressing is used with fish and shellfish salads, vegetable salads and meat salads.

True French dressing is just oil and vinegar, but the Americanized French dressing is the thick type of which the following recipe is an example:

"Swelegant" French Dressing

1 cup salad oil
1/2 cup cider vinegar
1 small can tomato hot sauce
1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. mustard
1/2 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. paprika
1 to 4 tps. sugar
3 buds garlic

Blend dry ingredients thoroughly, add vinegar gradually stirring to form a smooth paste. Then add



County Aid To Local Projects Totals \$17,464

Torrance received \$17,464 and Gardena but \$250 toward the cost of new street improvements aided by the \$5,520,000 allotted Los Angeles county from state gas and motor vehicle license monies last year, according to the report filed with the board of supervisors this week by the county road department.

County aid to cities amounted to \$3,731,000 of the \$5,520,000. Of this, Los Angeles city alone received \$2,870,000, while other smaller cities, including Torrance, got \$864,000. This total of \$3,731,000 is for new construction only.

The remaining \$1,886,000 of the \$5,520,000 was expended in unincorporated county territory and for maintenance work upon streets throughout the county. Maintenance work alone totaled \$1,284,000, the report sets forth. The remaining \$600,000 was distributed among miscellaneous items, one of which was \$78,159 for administration expense.

Principal projects aided in the vicinity of Torrance were Vermont avenue, 3.48 miles, just accepted this week by the supervisors, which was allotted \$184,915, and Riverside-Redondo boulevard, which was done entirely by force account \$139,608.

Wages paid day labor on new improvement projects totaled \$1,379,997, expended on roads, bridges and culverts. This is \$150,000 more than the \$1,223,618 expended to build roads, bridges, culverts and pedestrian subways by contract.
