Secretary Hyde to Speak Next Week For Hoover

Arthur M. Hyde, secretary of agriculture in the cabinet of President Hoover, is coming to Southern California to campaign for the re-election of his chief. Secretary Hyde will arrive in Los Angeles next Wednesday morning, October 19, and that evening will speak at a Republican mass meeting in San Diego. On Thursday evening he will address a Republican assemblage in Long Beach and on Friday evening will speak before a Hoover-Curtis meeting at the Philharmonic auditorium in Los Angeles. A former governor and a former congressman of Missouri, Secretary Hyde is noted as a speaker and an agricultural authority. The subject of his Los Angeles address will be the tariff.
