Engineering and Clerks Jobs Open For Registration

Metropolitan Water District Not Ready to Hire All Classes

Announcement in some metropolitan newspapers made recently that applications for work on the Metropolitan Water District project will be accepted now, should not be taken by Torrance citizens to mean that all jobs are thrown open to registration.

At the present time only applications for engineering and clerical jobs are being taken. Construction jobs are not yet available, as the project has not yet reached the stage where this class of labor is needed.

The board of directors has instructed its engineer to prepare plans and specifications for a certain portion of the work, with a view to submitting it to contractors' bids.

"Should this work and other work on the aqueduct be done by contract, all of the skilled and unskilled workmen on the job, will be employed directly by the contractors and not by the district.

"Persons who already have filed applications, including labor applications, filed prior to the time the personnel office was closed January 15, last, remain in good standing.

"It is expected the district will not be able to increase its forces for possibly six weeks or two months. Applications for engineering and clerical work filed at this time, however, will be carefully checked and graded.

HERE'S WHY THE WRIGHT ACT SHOULD BE REPEALED!

A Bulletin of Questions and Answers Prepared By BYRON C. HANNA former chief deputy district attorney of Los Angeles county, prominent civic leader

Q. Why should the Wright Act be repealed November 8? A. As an economic necessity to revive California prosperity through restoring \$250,000,000 annual revenue that came before prohibition from vineyards, barley and hop fields.

Q. Will Congress amend the Volstead act to permit beer and wines at the next session? A. Best informed authorities look upon this as a certainty due to governmental financial needs and the storm of public opinion against evils of prohibition.

Q. Will federal modification automatically annul the Wright act? A. Positively not. California remains a bone dry state unless the Wright act is repealed. If not repealed now, it will be two years before it can be taken off the statute books, and then only at a statewide election. The legislature is powerless to act.

Q. How will repeal of the Wright act revive prosperity? A. By creating jobs for thousands of the unemployed, lowering state taxes through eliminating enforcement costs, and giving to the state, counties, and cities legitimate revenue from licensing sale of wines and beer.

Q. Will Wright Act Repeal mean return of the saloon? A. Absolutely not. Proposition Number Two forbids saloons forever.

Q. Can Wright Act Repeal be considered an act of California disloyalty to the federal government? A. Certainly not. Numerous states have already repealed their enforcement acts, ten others vote on it this fall, and as the Eighteenth amendment does not require individual states to enforce prohibition, many never adopted such legislation.

Q. How shall I mark my ballot to be sure that my vote is cast for Wright Act Repeal? A. Put your cross in the "Yes" column opposite State Proposition Number One, and at the same time put your cross in the "Yes" column opposite Number Two to forbid return of the saloon.
