SOUP FOR SAVINGS

As the days grow cooler, nothing ever sweeter or tastier better than a plate of steaming soup, and nothing is more generous to the food budget. "Soup for Savings" is a grand slogan. Save all the bits of meat and vegetable and see how saving it is on the budget. Let's get out the old soup-kettle and give the family a treat. Of course, canned soup is mighty convenient to have on hand for emergencies and for every day use, but when it comes to real honest-to-goodness "whole meal in one dish of soup," it just has to be made at home.

The bones and bits of fat from Sunday's roast, or steak and the parsley garnish, an onion, an outside stalk of celery or two, a carrot—all are put to simmer in plenty of water. When everything is cooked to shreds, strain it and let the broth stand till cool. Skim off the fat and use this stock as the foundation for any number of soups.

Cereals, as rice or barley, pastes as vermicelli, macaroni shells, or noodles, alphabets—all are good, or vegetables finely diced or thin strips, about the size of a fat toothpick, of any variety you have, may be added.

If you are an onion fan, slice several, using your own judgment and taste; brown them carefully in about 2 tablespoonfuls of fat, and add them to the boiling broth. Then simmer for 5 minutes. Prepare a well toasted slice (round preferred) of bread for each serving, and place one in each soup plate. Sprinkle it generously with grated cheese—a full cream or Parmesan, and pour in the hot soup, ladling in plenty of onions—"nuff said."

One of the very best soups, however, is a cream of vegetable soup that may be made of most any kind of vegetable, but we like it particularly when made with fresh green peas—use these proportions:

- Green Pea Soup
1 can fresh green peas or
1 large can peas
Water from peas
3 green onions or leeks
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 cups milk

Simmer all but milk for 30 minutes and pour through a fine sieve. Add a few drops of green vegetable coloring, if you like, and just before serving, add milk and reheat, but do not boil.
