


### Sugar from Beet Crop Would Fill Rose Bowl



Not a snow pile in California, but the Rose Bowl at Pasadena as it would appear if filled with the sugar expected from the nation's 1932 sugar beet harvest. A crop of eight million tons of sugar beets is predicted.

The Rose Bowl, monster stadium at Pasadena, California, could be filled to overflowing with the sugar which will be extracted from the nation's 1932 sugar beet crop. With 813,000 acres under cultivation in the United States, crop statisticians predict that more than eight million tons of beets will be harvested. This promises a sugar output in excess of 1,100,000 tons. Poured into the Pasadena amphitheater, this quantity of sugar would fill every niche and cranny of its more than 17 million cubic feet and mount above the rims in a white peak, rivaling the beauty of the snow-covered tops of nearby mountains.

According to the United States Beet Sugar Association, more than 39,000 freight cars will be required to transport this sugar, at 28 tons to the car, from the extraction factories to points of distribution. Used as flavoring this sugar would sweeten a cup of coffee, al-

most half as large as Croton Lake Reservoir, source of water supply for New York City, with a thirty-three thousand million gallon capacity, or it would provide five teaspoonfuls of sweetening a day for every man, woman and child in the United States for an entire year.

Cash returns to the farmers, whose beets will yield this tremendous quantity of home-grown and home-manufactured sugar, are expected to amount to more than \$50,000,000. In addition, by-products of sugar beet cultivation will supply food for several hundred thousand head of cattle.

In the production of the sugar, including cultivation, harvesting and manufacture, more than 200,000 persons will be afforded employment. States in which these activities are carried on include California, Colorado, Nebraska, Nevada, Utah, Idaho, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Montana, Wyoming, Iowa, South Dakota, Washington, Michigan, Ohio and Oregon.

### Klusman Urges Vote Against Number Four

#### Would Work Hardship On Cities and Throw Men Out of Work

Mayor W. T. Klusman of Torrance today issued an official statement urging voters of Torrance to vote "No" on State Proposition No. 4 on the November ballot. In an appeal to defeat this amendment, which is the opening wedge to wholesale diversions of highway funds, Mayor Klusman said:

"Cities of California now receiving state financial aid in building links of through highways will inevitably lose this support if Proposition No. 4 on the November ballot is approved. Under permissive legislation adopted by the legislature the state highway commission is spending \$2,500,000 this biennium in assisting cities in constructing through traffic arteries. It is planned to double this appropriation during the next biennium and, in addition, the cities of the state are seeking a portion of the gasoline tax funds now allocated exclusively to the counties.

"Proposition No. 4 will divert \$500,000 a year in gross receipts taxes paid by truck and bus transportation companies from the highway fund to the state general fund. It is the opening wedge for wholesale diversion of gasoline tax funds from the highway to the general fund with a consequent break-down in the state highway program.

"The department of finance has already announced that it will ask legislative approval to divert some \$92,000,000 over a period of years to redemption of outstanding highway bonds.

"Depletion of highway funds will sound the death knell of state aid to cities and jeopardize the funds allotted to the counties.

This amendment is opposed by 90 per cent of the newspapers, California State Chamber of Commerce, California Federation of Labor, the two Automobile Clubs, League of California Municipalities, chambers of commerce, boards of supervisors, motor car dealers and hotel associations throughout the state.

### PROPOSITION NO. 9

An average of 55 cents on each \$100 of assessed valuation of common property in the counties will be credited to the account of the taxpayers of the state under the terms of the proposed tax relief measure, Initiative Amendment No. 9, sponsored by the California Real Estate Association and eight affiliated groups, according to Ray Westcott of the taxation committee of the Long Beach realty board, who addressed the Voters' League of Lomita on Friday, October 28.

"Thousands more than the required number of voters throughout the state, including the northernmost and southernmost counties, and the smallest communities, rallied behind the measure and signed it, the largest initiative

petition in the history of this state.

"The proposed amendment provides for the transfer of a part of the cost of operating and maintaining elementary and high schools to the state. It provides for the transfer from county tax sources (common property) to state sources of revenue approximately \$45,000,000 per annum in such a way as to utilize new sources of revenue and effect greater equality in the tax system.

"It will transfer a portion of the cost of California government from a property tax to an ability to pay basis.

It equalizes a portion of the burden for education.

"Even if it results in an ad valorem levy, it will result in a more equitable distribution of the tax burden because it will be spread upon all property, including the operative property of public utility corporations.

"It does not increase teachers' salaries nor interfere with reductions in teachers' salaries where such are necessary in the interest of economy and efficiency.

"It leaves control of the school system with local school boards.

"It is the principal measure before the people intended to grant prompt relief to the overburdened homes and farms of this state.

### Small Per Cent of City Population Now Unemployed

#### Report of Employment Stabilization Shows 352 Out of Work

Torrance has but 352 unemployed out of an estimated population of 7285, according to figures released this week by Harvey R. Fremming, director of employment stabilization for Los Angeles county. This percentage is low as compared with many other cities in the county, Fremming's records revealed.

While the figures are the total as of September 30, last, the number today is estimated by Fremming to be about 6.5 per cent less. He said this deduction should be made on account of seasonal employment, including work of gathering the citrus crop.

Compared with Torrance, for instance, is the unemployment registration in the city of Bell, a community adjoining Huntington Park on the east. The total for that city as of September 30 was 2063, which is approximately one-fifth of the city's estimated population of 10,000 persons.

Total for the county on September 30 was 208,200, while it was 201,869 on August 31, and 199,033 on July 30.

Figures for other cities throughout the county were given by Fremming as follows: Los Angeles, 135,620; Long Beach, 12,683; Pasadena, 10,174; Pomona, 555; Compton, 1189; Beverly Hills, 70; and San Fernando, 434.

The low figure for Pomona is accounted for, according to Fremming, by the walnut and citrus harvest. The exceptionally low figure of 70 for Beverly Hills' 18,000 estimated population, is accounted for by the class of residents, as most of the picture stars and other screen folk make their homes there. It also is pointed out that while many of the lesser luminaries would be eligible to register as unemployed, they prefer to wait their opportunity to again register upon the celluloid.

Under date of September 22, 1932, Boatman wrote one of his well-known postcards in which he said: "Visio et Venio of events of man and nature. Heavy cold waves, rain, extending unusually far southward, S. E. So. Calif., Arizona, New Mexico. Will take effect on Sunday, October 9, 1932." 
### Moneta School Site Purchase Approved


