semi-weekly programs of fifteen minutes each, will be broadcast over KFI. "Safeway Square" will go on the air Monday evenings at 7 o'clock; Friday evenings at 7:45. This "community singing" feature, it is pointed out, will be unique in that the air audience, through participation, will be made an integral part of the broadcast. The "master of ceremonies" will be a song leader.

One of the important features in connection with the program is the fact that the signature song—a sparkling fox-trot melody—was especially written for Safeway by Albert Von Tilzer, internationally famous composer of popular song hits for the last quarter century. Toy Makers Have Large Supply All Ready For Santa

Workshop At Torrance Fire Department Stored Full of Gifts

For several weeks past, members of the Torrance fire department have been putting in their spare time "out in the shop" where they are making up handsome and substantial toys for distribution to children of the city who might be overlooked by Santa Claus at Christmas time.

The job is now nearly completed. The toys are all made and most of them have been neatly painted, while some are still waiting the finishing touches of the painters' brushes.

More than 200 little tables, chairs, cradles, and other toys of that character have been made. They are not so little, either. They have been made to stand a lot of use and wear, the tables have tops about three feet square, so that four little tads may sit comfortably around them, and the chairs to match are strong and well made.

Very little expense has been incurred in the making of these toys, beyond the time spent upon them. Materials were gathered from various merchants, the Safeway Stores, Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company, Dean's Market, and others who donated a lot of apple boxes. The Los Angeles Ladder Company donated material to make the legs and rungs of chairs, and the Torrance Sash & Door Company loaned the use of its machinery for cutting all the material.

Members of the police and fire department contributed a moderate sum to purchase other needed articles, and the firemen have done the work, which is no small credit to their skill as furniture makers.

Thanks to the employees of this department there will be many happy kids in Torrance around Christmas time.

Work On Bridge Starts Next Week

Actual construction will be started next week on the \$60,000 bridge across the Los Angeles river channel on Del Amo street, which will permit traffic between Compton and Torrance to follow a more direct route than at present. E. S. McKittrick, contractor, this week moved his equipment to the bridge site. Piling for the bridge was expected to arrive this week. Meanwhile grading of the area between the Los Angeles river and the end of the project at Alameda street is proceeding by the county road department.

Figuroa Street Extension Opens New Territory

A "substantial allocation" of state funds for the completion of the Figuroa street project was asked by the Los Angeles city council this week, in adopting a resolution introduced by Councilman Roy L. Donley, chairman of the council's public works committee. The resolution pointed out that the artery eventually will extend from the harbor at San Pedro to the northern city limits, and thence through Pasadena and through the San Gabriel mountains to Palmdale and Antelope valley.

North of the Los Angeles city limits the artery would be carried through to Palmdale as a county and state highway, under Donley's resolution.

Meanwhile, the contracting firm engaged in constructing the remaining link between 153rd and 155th streets, is reported to be making rapid progress. The completed link, affording direct connection between the area east of Torrance and Los Angeles, is expected to be opened before the end of the present year.
