

Six Persons Are Injured As Car Hits Ambulance

Spectacular Crash at Boulevard Junction May Cause Death of Two

Mrs. Carl Wass, Los Angeles, was brought to the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital Saturday afternoon, where she was treated for fracture of the femur and pelvic bones, following a spectacular crash between Mrs. Wass' car and a private ambulance at the intersection of Main and Broadway. Mrs. Wass' two children, Doris, aged 11, and James, aged 8, were seriously injured. The girl received a skull fracture which may cause death and, the boy was severely hurt with internal injuries. As two ambulances were called to the scene the children were placed in one and rushed to the Georgia street receiving hospital, while the mother was placed in a Gardena ambulance and brought to Torrance, later to be removed to a hospital in San Pedro where her husband, an ex-navy man, is employed. Mrs. Wass was thought to be also suffering from a skull fracture.

The accident occurred when an ambulance from the Glade L. White Mortuary in Hermosa Beach was transporting Ralph Bandini, member of the pioneer Bandini family, to the Pasadena hospital to have some X-rays taken. Elliott Bandini, of 401 Via Media street, Palos Verdes, was riding in the ambulance with his brother. Mrs. Elliott Bandini was following the ambulance in her automobile. Ralph Bandini, who resides in Montrose, was stricken while visiting his brother in Palos Verdes, his illness having been later diagnosed as a ruptured appendix. Police were expected to fix the blame for the crash this week, as when the two machines collided the Wass automobile was overturned and completely wrecked. The ambulance was put out of commission, and Rex Ensign, 35, the driver, of Hermosa Beach, sustained a serious head injury and numerous cuts and bruises. Keith Selby, attendant in the ambulance, escaped with cuts and bruises. Elliott Bandini sustained an injured knee, but directed his brother to be placed in his wife's car, following behind, and they were delayed but 10 minutes. Mrs. Wass and her two children were given emergency treatment by Dr. W. A. Lindberg of 14220 South Main street. Meantime, Los Angeles police had been notified of the accident.

Applications For Auto License Must Include County Name

SACRAMENTO.—Motor vehicle owners of California were asked today by Russell Bevans, registrar of the Department of Motor Vehicles to be sure that the county of their residence appears in the space provided upon their certificates of registration before applying for new license plates. Bevans explained that this information is desired by the department for use in apportioning license fees to the counties from which vehicles are registered.

Several complaints, he said, have been received from counties that residents of one county are giving an address in another thus depriving their own home county of the portion of fees apportioned to them. For example, he said, a resident of San Mateo county who worked or had a business in San Francisco might deprive his home county of the fee by giving his San Francisco address.

"The department is trying very hard to see that every county gets all the fees that are coming to it but our only means of knowing where the motor vehicle owner lives is the address given on his certificate," Bevans said.

General construction work, electrical, marble and tile work on the new Torrance health center was accepted this week by the board of supervisors. At the same time the county declined to penalize the contractors because their work was not completed within the time limit specified in the contract, holding that the contractors were not at fault directly for the additional time necessary to complete the contract.

C. Bongiovanni was the general contractor, electrical work was done by H. H. Walker and Company, and marble and tile was placed by the Long Beach Marble and Tile Company. William Davidson, the county's chief mechanical engineer, recommended that the work of the general contractor be accepted, following an inspection last week. Request for six electric fans for the new building was turned down by the supervisors. The fans were requested by the health department, but Engineer Davidson recommended the request be denied because they would not be used until summer.
