### Large Amounts Foodstuffs Aid Veterans' Relief

Hundreds of Pounds Grapes and Oranges Come From Delano Camp

Sixty-five hundred pounds of oranges and 2000 pounds of grapes were this week added to supplies at headquarters of the Veterans' Cooperative Association of Torrance, and with the added help of funds turned over by the Torrance Men's Bible class as the result of a benefit entertainment, plans were being carried through to give special aid to unemployed at Christmas.

Oranges and grapes will be exchanged for other needed supplies, and funds from the Bible class will be used for the buying of meats, James Obole, in charge of operations during the absence of H. W. Beach, yesterday announced. Christmas relief will then be made through the association itself, before Christmas, or through the Torrance Relief Society, the latter organization having planned to distribute Christmas baskets.

"We have contributed about 500 cans of tomatoes, 250 cans of peaches, and nearly 2000 pounds of oranges, in addition to helping in the packing of baskets," Mr. Obole explained, adding that approximately 600 pounds of cabbage and 500 pounds of celery are also being given.

Work currently being carried on at Veterans' Relief headquarters includes the daily serving of lunch to approximately 100 persons, who are working for the organization. In addition foodstuffs are distributed, these including supplies put up during the summer, vegetables and fruit received from the concentration camp at Delano, and other contributions received in return for work done by men sent out by the Veterans' Relief. The organization has also been furnishing vegetables and fruit for the lunches of needy school children.


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### Liquor Develops Extra Cost For Lynwood Man

### Passer of Bogus Checks Is Sought

Torrance police were this week keeping watch for a black roadster, 1930 model Chevrolet, as the result of warrants broadcast last Friday, by headquarters of the Los Angeles county sheriff's office to apprehend a passer of bad checks.
