Burkhardt had appeared before the supervisors in response to a subpoena and stated that he was the record owner of the property and that he approved of its use for cemetery purposes.

### Citrus Fruit Judges Finish In Fourth Place

Torrance Makes Good Showing at Orange Show Competition

Torrance high school citrus judging team, which competed Saturday at the National Orange show, San Bernardino, finished fourth in a list of 11 contestants.

Banning high school of Wilmington, Torrance's most feared rivals, carried off first honors in Class A and B.

Torrance entered only in the class A judging. Those who represented the local school were Kenneth Fesse, Dale Howe, Melvin Howard, with Francis Mowry as alternate.

Their scores were fourth in judging packed boxes, fourth in lemons, fifth in grapefruit, and sixth in oranges. Their total points score was 2208 out of a possible 2400.

Other schools which competed included San Bernardino, which finished second; Chaffee, third; Nordhoff of Ojai, Perris, Riverside, Hemet, Garden Grove, Chino vocational and Ventura.

Marion Mintun, president of the local Future Farmers of America, high school agricultural classes organization, was called upon to speak at a banquet held following the judging. He made a brief speech to tell of the activities of Torrance Future Farmers.
