COUNCIL TO CONFER WITH EXPERT ON WATER PROBLEM

Ludlow Forces Action Over Protests of Mayor Klusman, Who Again Attempts to Delay Matters

Further attempts to delay action on Torrance's proposed new municipal water system were made by Mayor W. T. Klusman at the Tuesday evening meeting of the city council. However, plans to retain a consulting engineer to assist the city council in its study of the problem and to collaborate with City Engineer Leonard in construction plans, were made over the protest of Mayor Klusman. An informal meeting will be held at 7 p. m. next Tuesday for preliminary discussion of the matter with a well-known hydraulic engineer.

The action was instigated by Councilman Scott Ludlow and met with an argument from Mayor Klusman that no steps should be taken until the council had received a report from the Torrance Water, Light & Power Company. Ludlow contended that the water company should have had its report ready months ago, as it has been known for years that the city would consider a proposal to purchase the present water company. Councilmen Hitchcock and Conner supported Councilman Ludlow in his request for asking that a meeting be arranged with an expert on water systems. Councilman Wright stated in the meeting that he did not care to enter into the discussion, but he informed the Herald yesterday that he is opposed to the purchase of the present water company's property, and favors the construction of a new municipal system.

In a final effort to delay proceedings, Mayor Klusman asked that the meeting between the consulting engineer and the council be arranged by him, but Ludlow refused to do so, and he said he wanted action. The motion was adopted to hold the informal meeting next Tuesday evening.

J. C. Rambo & Company, city auditors, are to start work on preparation of the bond issue next week, Councilman Ludlow reported. Ralph Hoerr, 1907 Arlington, remonstrated at the present high water rates and stated that he was in favor of going ahead with the construction of a new water system.
