Zamperini Sets New Record

Torrance Lad Out In Front Class B Event

First Time In Years Honors In C. I. F. Come To This City

For the first time in years, if ever, Torrance high school colors were out in front in the finals of the big Southern California meet, held at Los Angeles high school field Saturday.

Louis Zamperini, crack miler for the Red and White, who has led the field in every race he has entered this year, turned the trick with a sensational victory in the Class B distance event, 1320 yards, when he set a new record for the event of 3:17.7. This tops by more than three seconds the old mark which has stood for several seasons.

Pacific Coast Air Races Held At Long Beach

Many Outstanding Aerial Performers Entered In Event

Speed kings and queens of the air will compete in a spectacular program of races and stunt flying at the Pacific Coast Air Races to be held May 25 at Long Beach as a benefit for earthquake relief.

The event, sponsored by Arthur L. Peterson Post, No. 27, American Legion, of the seacoast metropolis, promises to bring together an imposing array of aviators from all sections of the West.

Spectators may expect to witness such outstanding aerial performers as Florence Lowe Bases, Colonel Roscoe Turner, Gladys O'Donnell and others.

A race in which the participating planes will be required to negotiate the distance upside down is expected to prove one of the thrilling events. This novel stunt, it is said, has never been attempted before.

Exhibitions of tactical maneuvers by army and navy fliers also are billed as feature attractions with perhaps as many as 50 planes taking part in each division.

The program is scheduled to start at 12:30 p. m., continuing until 5:30 p. m.

Huntington Beach Keeps Home Boys On Edge Till Eighth

The Torrance Bluebirds, battling gamely against the lead which Huntington Beach took in the first inning and kept until the last half of the eighth, finally won out 6-5 on an error by Conrad, second baseman, who juggled Alesso's short drive, a single by Forney and a single by Wolfe who came through after two were out, to clinch the battle for the home boys.

The game was fast and thrilling all the way. A crowd of about 800 people watched the fray and went wild with excitement when Forney dashed over the plate with the winning run.

Huntington Beach stepped out in the first to pick up two runs on Neva on a double by Schubardt, a single by Maness, who scored on Conrad's single, who splintered his bat on a fast one which caused the ball to go dead in the air and Watson missed the catch. Torrance got one in their half, and both teams scored in the fourth.

In the sixth, Lower, ex-Bluebird catcher, sent in to bat for Clemmons, left fielder, smacked one for two bases, scoring two runs, but was thrown out at the plate when Osborne popped out to Vonderahe who pegged to Fabregat in Ming to nip Lower for the third out.

With the score now 5-2, Torrance turned on Lefty Morning for two hits, one of them a home run by Forney, which brought the boys up to striking distance of the victory again. Morning was jerked and Chico Savella took his place on the mound, to strike out three in a row. It looked bad for the home boys but not for long, as they got to Savella in the eighth for two hits, two runs and the game being in a three-way tie for first in the league standing.



Fishing Crew Sent To Prison For Killing Cow

Authorities Make Determined Effort to Halt Cattle Rustling
AVALON, Catalina Island.—Cattle rustling comes high on the Channel Islands. Not only did Captain Anton Orab, commercial fisherman, and his crew of two men have to pay \$500 for the cow they killed on Catalina Island, but all three will serve sentences on a felony charge. The superior court has sustained the sentence imposed by the local court, as sentenced by Judge W. S. Pickett of the superior court to serve 12 months in the Los Angeles county jail and his two men, found guilty of killing the animal, received sentences of from one to ten years in San Quentin prison. Judge Pickett also instructed the defendants to pay for the cow.
