

Torrance chalked up a row of home runs for the first three frames and then corralled enough runs to tie the score at three-all by the end of the fifth. In the seventh a walk to Hill followed by a bombardment of four hits, put Santa Ana way in front, 8-1. It looked hopeless for the Bluebirds, but this gang of Frank Merriwells can climb out of holes faster than the other team can dig them, and to this fighting aggregation no game is ever lost until the last man is out.

So up pops Joe Storti in the eighth with a bingle that gets him to first and on a succession of sacrifices Joe gets home. One run. In the ninth the Torrance fans who had followed the team to Santa Ana went frantic when Vonderahe's triple and three other hits brought in two more, which made it all even and the boys started fresh.

Santa Ana was out in brief order in their half of the ninth. Torrance slammed out two more hits and an error by Dally helped to bring in the winning tally.



Johnny Yelovich, Lomita pitcher who tried out with the Los Angeles Angels this spring, will be one of the string of hurlers for the Catalina Island baseball team now being organized to play at the offshore summer resort every day except Monday.

Final arrangements for the proposition were completed by executives of the Santa Catalina Island Company in a meeting with Phillip K. Wrigley, who has taken the lead in the movement to provide extra entertainment for visitors to the island.

The island team, drafted from outstanding semi-pro material of the mainland, will be known as the "Catalina Islanders." Roy Johnson, well known in baseball circles as the manager of the Bismarck ball club of the Arizona State League, is the manager. The team will arrive at Catalina Wednesday, May 24, to take up their headquarters in a group of bungalows in preparation for their adjoining the island baseball diamond. Lockers and showers of the Catalina Country Club will be turned over to the use of the team, affording the finest accommodations any ball team has ever had the privilege to "luxuriate" in. Also it is probably the first time that a ball team will practically sleep at the ball park.
