Local Churches Share Proceeds of Bowl Drama

"David," Biblical Music-drama, Presented at Hollywood in June

The church folks in Torrance and vicinity are enthusiastically engaged in a campaign which they confidently expect will add considerable cash to their church funds, and at the same time afford all an opportunity to witness what is expected to be the greatest spectacle ever staged at Hollywood Bowl, home of the "symphonies under the stars."

"David, the Boy Shepherd Who Became King," a Biblical music-drama by Milton Anderson, is to be presented at the Bowl, beginning June 9 and continuing for a limited run, and as it is sponsored by the Academy of Religious Arts, a non-profit institution, the churches and their organizations will benefit greatly. Torrance churches will receive 25 per cent of all ticket sales made by their workers, and the church organizations of Southern California are also to share in the net profits of the undertaking.

Milton Anderson, executive secretary of the sponsor group, and in direct charge of production, promises "an epoch-making presentation of David, with William Farnum as King Saul, Angelo Ross in the title role, and other stage notables in all important parts. The Bowl orchestra shell is being moved out of the way to make adequate room for the score of magnificent scenes, notably that of the battle between David and Goliath in the presence of the armies of Israel and Philistia. Some 1500 people and hundreds of horses, camels, chariots, etc., will be used in some of the scenes.

The Hollywood Symphony orchestra, under the direction of Herr Hans Blechschmidt, will interpret the music, especially written by Norman Sorenson Wright, noted pianist-composer, for this production. A chorus of 250 voices is now in rehearsal.

The P. E. lines have established a low excursion rate and will provide special direct service to and from the Bowl for parties of 50 from all nearby communities, including Torrance.
