### Reduction In Rate To Water Consumers of Lomita Company

A concession permitted by the railroad commission, which will operate as a reduction in rates to the patrons of Narbonne Ranch Water Company No. 2, is announced by Mrs. Tirzah Taber, who has charge of the office of the company, this week. All patrons who are not in arrears on their water bills, who pay the current month's statement within 15 days from the time when it is rendered, will be permitted to deduct 25 cents from the rate of \$1.50 per 1000 feet, which is charged by the company. Should the bill not be paid within the specified time, the regular rate will apply. The granting of this concession, it is hoped, will bring about a prompt settlement of water bills and a gradual reduction in the amount of bills which are now unpaid.


