School Budget For Coming Year Will Be Cut \$1,848,000

Budget of the Los Angeles city school district for 1933-34 will be \$1,848,000 less than last year, a reduction of 6.10 per cent, it was announced this week. The total budget is \$28,478,000.

Amount requested for new buildings and other capital outlays is but \$1,334,468, which is \$222,000 more than last year. This is because the district's final payment on the last junior college parcel of land is \$736,000 this year as compared to \$555,000 for last year. Actual money to be raised by taxes is \$24,965,000, the balance of \$2,508,000 being a net surplus applied to the budget. The estimated tax rate is \$1.78, as compared with \$1.80 for the past year, based on the assessed valuation showing an average reduction of 12 per cent, according to preliminary estimates of the county assessor.
