ers use them in their plantings and by doing the same we can save some money.

There are a great many annuals and perennials that may be planted at this time, also. These include the various wild flowers of California such as baytonia, godetia, the California poppy, clarkia and nemophila. The latter may be sown over the tulip or hyacinth bed about January 1 and they will bloom the same time as the others, making a nice show. Other flower seed that may be sown in the open air, calendula, marigold, any of the perennial poppies, larkspur, hollyhocks and those of the hardier flowers. By planting perennials now we can save about four months time in getting them to bloom. You will be pleasantly surprised at the show the dimorphotheca hydriflora or African daisy will give you. Try them, even though they are not good for-out flowers they will give an excellent border effect in salmon, orange and pink.

Lecture On Bible At Church Tonight

Ed Schwartz Is Victimized By Bad Check Passer

Ed Schwartz, proprietor of the Store for Men, 1505 Cabrillo avenue, was victimized this week to the extent of \$15 by a stranger from whom he accepted a check in payment for goods. According to police investigation, the check was one of a check stolen from the B. Street Machine Works, 527 West B street, Wilmington, and was drawn to Benj. Barton, signed by T. B. Lewis.

The check-passer is described as American, 35 years of age, five feet seven inches tall, weight 170 pounds, wearing a chamouis jacket, blue shirt and overalls and a cap. Under his endorsement on the back is the address, 1632 El Dorado, a number that does not exist in Torrance.

Two other checks passed by the same suspect were discovered in Huntington Park.

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
