

Rancher Named As Director of Edison Company

"Real Dirt Farmer" Elected to Official Family of Great Concern

Announcement of the election of A. J. McFadden, Santa Ana rancher and prominent in California agricultural marketing organiza-

tions, as a member of the board of directors of the Southern California Edison Company Ltd., was made September 29 by Harry J. Bauer, president of the company. Mr. McFadden is a California native son. He was born in Santa Ana and has made his home there continuously. He is a graduate of Pomona College and Harvard law school. Since 1907 he has devoted his entire time to farming and related agricultural interests. He has a large citrus ranch in Santa Ana and other ranch properties in the San Joaquin valley. He is a director of the California Fruit Exchange, Sacramento; the Irvine Valencia Growers' Exchange; Commercial Bank of Santa Ana; president of the Irvine Walnut Growers' Association; president of the Southern California Pearsimon Growers' Association, and chairman of the California Pro-Rate Commission.

"We are fortunate in gaining for our board a real dirt farmer," Mr. Bauer said. "Everyone knows that agriculture is the basic industry in Southern California. In order to supply the necessary water for irrigation, electric power is required. From the community standpoint, it will be very helpful to have as a member of the board a man who has a thorough understanding of agricultural problems. The election of Mr. McFadden will bring to us first-hand authentic information concerning the mutual dependence between electric power and the business of farming."

Monday Only Day to Take Driver's Tests

Torrance residents who wish to take examinations for driver's licenses are reminded by the city police department that these tests are given only on Monday afternoon each week. Only residents of Torrance are eligible to apply at the local station. Others must apply in their own cities, or in Long Beach or Los Angeles.

Keeping Up With Torrance High

Next Thursday evening, the night before Torrance's most important football game, the students of Torrance high plan to show their confidence in their home football team by staging a gigantic "Pep Rally" with a bonfire and all the trimmings. The rally will be held in a vacant lot opposite the school auditorium. A lively time is guaranteed everyone who turns out to support our team, and all Torrance residents are asked to join in the demonstration.

Last term the journalism class instituted a daily news service for the school. The most important news for the day is issued in the form of a one-page bulletin called the "Daily News." So far this year there has been a different editor for every issue. A dozen copies of the Daily News are posted on the bulletin boards in the various buildings. The print shop has this year provided a distinctive heading which adds much to the attractiveness of the bulletin.

Today the various clubs in the senior high school will resume their activities. Several new clubs have been added to the list; a few of them are archery, golf, Red Cross and library. The rule that no student may join more than two clubs is being strictly enforced. This ruling, of course, does not include scholarship members who may join two other clubs if they wish. Club meetings are to be held during the recreation period. Every student who wishes to join a club will have the opportunity.

The recreation period Wednesday, September 27, was set aside for class meetings. The "P" seniors used this opportunity to elect officers for the semester. Those elected were James Lee, president; Charles Williams, vice president; Ruth Nabors, secretary; Margaret Floyd, treasurer. A committee was also chosen to select some sweaters from which the class will make a selection.

In recreation all the girls have been divided into teams of ten or eleven. Each team has chosen a name by which they will go hereafter. Some of the names are humorous, and other are very clever. A few of the names are these: Nims, Sensus, Vincimus, Wild Cats, Speedies, Vikings, Dynamites, Raspberries, and the Petunias.

There have been two additions to the recreation hour. They are library and singing. These are held different days only once a week. The library is a class giving students a chance to read the things in which they are interested. Miss Behr, the librarian, gives short talks on the new books as they arrive and sometimes reads good short stories. The sing is held at the American Legion hall, where Mr. Casey leads the students in various songs they like.

SCHOOLS REOPENED







First Aqueduct Tunnel Is Open

Metropolitan water district tunnel crews were busy today clearing out the remaining debris in Wide Canyon tunnel No. 2, the first of the 20 Colorado river aqueduct bores to be completed.

Eight hundred forty-eight feet long, the finished bore is the shortest of all the aqueduct's tunnels. Its length is approximately equal to that of the Third street tunnel in Los Angeles between Hill and Hope streets.

The opening of the small tunnel will enable district engineers to connect two larger bores with a railway line on which men and machinery may be shuttled from one tunnel to the other.

BOLT AND NUT USED AS COLLAR BUTTON
 POCATELLO, Idaho, (U.P.)—A stove bolt and nut, used as a collar button by Jack Burnett since March, 1934, caused no little excitement at the Bannock county jail when it was lost.

Burnett, a contractor furnishing meals to prisoners, said he started wearing it when as a stove salesman at Alamosa, Colorado, he lost his regular button.

Zoning Laws to Regulate Building In Keystone Dist.

Zoning laws today regulate the uses to which property may be put in Keystone, heavily populated community east of Torrance and north of Wilmington on Main street.

New dairy establishments and heavy industries are not permitted by the new zoning regulations, imposed by the board of supervisors at the recommendation of the county regional planning commission. This may have the effect of steering future heavy industries into Torrance, where conditions are more ideal in many ways. Existing dairies will not be required to move from the Keystone area, but no new ones will be allowed, according to A. E. Williamson, zoning engineer for the commission.

Buildings are restricted to homes of the rural type, with gardens and chickens.

Fern Ave. P. T. A. Membership Growing

The Fern Avenue Parent Teachers Association was organized last April. Those joining them are members until February 1934.

The drive this fall has increased the membership by 40 so far. The first meeting was held Tuesday afternoon. The regular meeting day is the fourth Tuesday in each month at 2 p. m. Everyone, whether a member or not, is invited to attend these meetings.
