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Sales Tax Nets State Large Sum In First Quarter

Nearly \$8,000,000, Exclusive of Deferred Payments, Received

SACRAMENTO—Evidencing a decided upturn in California business, receipts under the state 2 1/2 per cent sales tax for the first and short quarter—August and September—totalled \$7,287,569.53, exclusive of deferred payments, it was announced today by Fred E. Stewart, member of the state board of equalization.

When receipts pour in from the companies which have asked an extension of time, Stewart predicted that total income from the sales levy for the two-month quarter would exceed the \$8,000,000 mark.

Extensions of time have been granted to several large merchandising concerns, due to complications in auditing and bookkeeping, Stewart said, and there will also be a substantial addition from charge accounts.

"The returns for the first quarter, even though it is a short quarter, demonstrate conclusively the very real relief accorded to common property by the Riley-Stewart program, which the people adopted at the special election last June," said Stewart.

"The sales levy has proved its ability to carry more than \$10,000,000 annually in school costs formerly collected from local taxpayers or the owners of real and personal property.

"This relief has permitted California government to achieve a splendid state of solvency which has raised the securities of California municipalities and districts to the highest point in the nation. It has helped our business; it is paving the way for improved land valuations which will benefit every citizen in the state. But beyond
