**COMMUNITY FROLIC ON ALL SAINTS EVE NEXT YEAR PLAN**

Mayor Conner Suggests Big City Celebration At Local Ball Park As Solution for Halloween Nocturnal Misdemeanors

"What this community needs," said Mayor C. Earl Conner Wednesday morning when Halloween had come and gone, leaving a lot of used tomatoes scattered about the streets, real estate signs parked in the wrong places, awnings torn down and various other signs of the presence of some unruly nocturnal sprites.

"What this community needs is a good old-fashioned Halloween party, where all the citizens, young and old, could get together and have a lot of fun in the good old harmless way."

"But he that is that," he may, the practice of celebrating Halloween as it is done now, is an expensive piece of business to the city. Extra police have to be put on the night force. Extra runs have to be made with the police cars. Extra precautions have to be taken against fires. It costs the city money, and it costs the merchants and householders time and money to clean up the soaped windows, carry away old boxes and barrels and other trash that is flung on the lawns and porches. It costs time and money to hunt up missing small property. This does not mean much to the kids but it means a lot to a busy merchant or housekeeper.

And so the evening was utterly ruined for one squad of merry-makers.

**Electrolux Man Wins High Honor**  
Gas Refrigerator Expert is Given Chas. A. Monroe Award

Granting of high honors to Dr. William R. Hainsworth, scientist, mountain-climber and former football player, for his scientific research work in perfecting the new air-cooled gas refrigerator, has been announced by P. W. Walters, of Southern California Gas Company. Dr. Hainsworth is director of the Electrolux Gas Refrigerator Laboratory at Evansville, Indiana.

In recognition of the part Dr. Hainsworth has played in bringing gas refrigeration to its present state of usefulness throughout the United States, he was chosen as this year's recipient of the Charles A. Monroe award, granted annually for "the most outstanding contribution by an individual to the advancement of the gas industry."

Bestowal of the Monroe award to Dr. Hainsworth on September 28 at Chicago was the feature of the 15th annual convention of the American Gas Association. The presentation of the award, consisting of a cash prize, was made personally to the director of the Electrolux Refrigerator Laboratory by Dr. Munroe, a leading citizen of Chicago, the donor of the award.

Dr. Hainsworth's scientific activities in connection with the type of refrigeration exemplified by Electrolux date back to experiments at the famous Massachusetts Institute of Technology which gave him his doctor's degree in 1921. Most of Dr. Hainsworth's activities in automatic refrigeration research have been made in the Electrolux laboratory of which he became director in 1929.

Small glass pineapple juice	100
Coffee (milk instead of cream, no sugar)	25
LUNCH	
1/2 cup macaroni and cheese	150
Broiled tomato (with lump of butter)	90
2 large fresh plums or 1 slice pineapple	50
1 glass of milk	150
DINNER	
Tomato juice	25
Medium serving chicken salad with 1 tsp. of mayonnaise thinned with 1 tbsp. of milk	150
1 slice bread or roll	100
Small pat of butter	50
5 stalks asparagus with 1 level teaspoonful drawn butter	60
1 glass of milk	150
1 small piece of cake	100
