## TARTARS HOLD BANNING TO NO SCORE IN TOUGH BATTLE

### Chance For Touchdown In Last Two Minutes Lost As Banning Defense Stiffs On 12-Yard Line; Johnson's Long Passes Help

Watson's pass to McFadden, who ran to the 12-yard line before he was downed in the last two minutes of play, proved to be the Tartars' last threat to score in the Banning game, played Friday at Banning field.

Both teams showed up well and every move was hotly contested. The Tartars had a little of the best of it on penalties, with Banning losing 50 yards and Torrance 30, and also displayed better passing ability. Johnson for the Red and Gray heaved some long ones, two of which were completed for substantial gains and four fell out of reach.

The Banning horde tried the air also, but were able to complete only one pass, while Javens and Watson intercepted two of the other five attempted.

The Torrance game was marred by a couple of fumbles which did no damage as they were recovered by Tartars.

Collette, Banning fullback, was

the outstanding player for his team, with his terrific smashes through the line. Johnson, left end, starred for Torrance with his long passes.

The yardstick showed that the teams were well matched. Banning lost 50 yards on penalties, while Torrance lost 30. Each team completed five first downs. On exchange of punts the Banning boys gained four yards, their boots averaging 34 yards to 30 for Torrance.

## Crack Miler of Torrance Takes Distance Event

### Louis Zamperini Is First In Two-mile Practice Run At Compton Saturday

Louis Zamperini, Torrance high school's champion miler, undefeated in the Marine League last year, and winner of first place in the Class B Southern California finals at Los Angeles last spring, when he set up a new state record of 3:17.7 for the 1500-yard run, took first place in the two-mile practice run at Compton last Saturday with a mark of 10:25.7.

Louie was in 50 yards ahead of his nearest competitor in a field of 15, with his big brother Pete who runs for Compton Junior college in third place.

La Verno Jones, also a consistent point winner for Torrance high last spring, placed seventh.

The boys went into the practice run without any preliminary training, merely for the experience, and young Zamperini surprised even himself by taking first place easily. The showing of the Torrance boys was all the more remarkable since they were competing away over their heads against older and more experienced runners representing junior colleges.
