

# TORRANCE=NARBONNE IN NEW LEAGUE

## MARINE LEAGUE DISSOLVED AT MEETING HELD MONDAY

Unanimous Vote of Officials Sets Up Two Leagues Composed of Larger and Smaller Schools in the Old Organization; Playing Schedule Shortened

By unanimous vote of the members of the official body of the Marine League, at a meeting held Monday at Jacob Riis high school, the league was formally dissolved and two new leagues were formed of the schools which have hitherto been included.

Torrance, Narbonne, El Segundo, Leuzinger and Gardena will be one of the leagues, and will retain the name Marine League. Jordan, Jacob Riis, Banning, Bell and South Gate will form the other league and will choose a suitable name. The separation will become effective at the beginning of the next semester.

Action along this line has been much desired by one or two of the smaller schools for the past three years. In view of the fact that the set-up placed a handicap on those institutions where the turnout for football was numerically small and physically light.

The larger schools had an abundance of beef and brawn, and only the revolving schedule which has been in effect since the Marine League was revamped several years ago, has saved the smaller schools from being swamped by their heavier opponents. The revolving schedule however, proved unsatisfactory, since it led to such situations as exist this year, with Bell and Narbonne, who did not meet on the regular schedule, tied for the championship.

Under the school board's ruling against post season games this tie will stand unless the plan for a "football carnival" at the Coliseum, November 29, is finally adopted when Bell and Narbonne will be granted the space of 15 minutes to fight it out.

By realigning the teams into two leagues in future the larger schools will play each other and will not overlap into competition with lighter squads who have no business in their territory.

The folly of such a procedure was decisively shown last week when the Torrance squad was sent against Bell which outweighed them 30 pounds to the man and had enough reserves to send in more than 16 substitutes. The home team took a battering that will last them for a long time. Two of the Torrance players were completely knocked out and one of them did not recover consciousness until after the game had ended 30 minutes later.

The new set-up will shorten the playing schedules in football, basketball and baseball, unless another team is taken into the official family. However, there is a scant possibility that this will be done in the new Marine League as there is no school near by which qualifies.

Not only will the new set-up shorten the schedule, but it will reduce the expense of the games by cutting down the distance to be traveled which cuts into the school day and also by eliminating the expense of officials in charge for the one or two games which will be dropped.

With a five-team league the schedule will be cut down to five and possibly four games.

## Gauchos Upset South Gate In Last Half, 13-6

Narbonne Squad Finishes Season With Clean Slate to Tie For League Title

The Narbonne Gauchos clamped down on South Gate in the second half last Friday to take a 13-6 struggle and clinch their position in a tie with Bell for the championship of the Marine League.

South Gate led at the end of the first half, 6-0, but the Gauchos came back strong in the third and fourth periods to score two touchdowns and convert once for a total of 13 points.

Allen Rider, right half for the Gauchos, carried the ball over after two sustained drives.

Vance scored for South Gate. The Gauchos went through the season with a clean slate, no ties and no defeats, scoring 135 points against 25 for its opponents. Bell, its nearest rival, scored 116 points against 6, the lone touchdown made by Torrance in the last game of the season.

## HEAVY BELL TEAM CRUSHES TARTARS IN FINAL BATTLE

Seven Touchdowns Scored Off Light Torrance Team In Terrific Struggle On Home Field; Torrance Only Team to Score On Opponents

Outweighed an average of 30 pounds to the man, the Torrance Tartars lost last Friday in the closing game of the 1933 Marine League season to Bell, tied with Narbonne for the championship, 45 to 6.

The Torrance lads, outclassed and outweighed, put up one of the gamiest battles ever seen on this field and while they lost, they earned a lot of credit for the way they stayed in and fought. They scored the only points made against Bell this season.

Credit for the lone Tartar touchdown goes to Captain Milton Everett, playing his last game at center for Torrance, who blocked a kick from the Bell five-yard line and fell on the ball as it rolled over the goal line. Everett has played all season under a handicap of an injured shoulder, and in spite of it has put up the best game at this position that the Tartars have had in several years.

The Tartars sprung a surprise on Bell in the first play after the kickoff when Johnson heaved a long pass to McFadden that netted 25 yards. The Bell outfit was backed up to its goal line as a result of the pass and the forced punt that was blocked by Everett gave Torrance the first score of the game.

The Red and Gray had the spirit but they lacked the reserves to hold their advantage. Against a big powerful team, Bell had the reserves and used them. The Bell coach sent in seven substitutes in one quarter and nine in the final, making practically three fresh teams which were hurled against the tired Tartars.
