Liquor Dealers Must Make Returns and Pay Floor Tax

Collector of Internal Revenue John P. Carter was instructed today by the commissioner of internal revenue to notify all dealers in and the manufacturers of liquors, wines, cordials, alcohol, rectified spirits, etc., to take inventory of their stocks on hand at the beginning of business, Friday, January 12, 1934, and to be prepared to make returns and pay "floor tax" on such stocks on hand. The inventory must be in triplicate and show the quantity of each kind of liquor, rectified spirits, wines, cordials, alcohol, etc., with the alcoholic content of each.

Collector Carter states that proper forms for return of this "floor tax" on liquors, wines, cordials, rectified spirits, alcohol, etc., will be mailed to all persons of record immediately upon receipt from Washington. Failure to receive a form, however, will not constitute reasonable cause for delinquency in making such return nor prevent penalties for not being on time. When received, forms may be secured at the collector's office, second floor, 939 South Broadway, Los Angeles, and at all branch offices.
