New Block of Metropolitan Bonds Is Sold

Continued Work For the Next Six Months Is Assured By Sale

Continued Colorado river aqueduct construction over another six months period was assured today, following action by the board of directors of the Metropolitan water district, accepting a bid from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation on an \$8,061,000 block of aqueduct bonds. The recent sale brings the total amount of the aqueduct bonds disposed of to date up to \$22,176,000. All bonds have been sold to the federal corporation and bear an interest rate of five per cent. The sale was consummated under terms of an agreement between the district and the federal agency under which the R. F. C. pledged itself to bid on and purchase Colorado river aqueduct bonds up to \$10,000,000. It is with funds secured under this agreement that the water district is pushing forward rapidly with aqueduct construction. At the present time work is going ahead from 31 camps. Eighty-two miles of tunneling is under way, and contracts and commitments made by the district total approximately \$60,000,000.

Another feature of the district board meeting was the installation of Charles T. Rippey as director representing the city of Torrance. Training schools for Civil War service workers are operating this week in Inglewood, Torrance, Compton, El Monte, Bellflower, Pomona and other sections of the county. In these training institutes a thousand CWA workers are being taught by the county department of recreation the fundamentals of conducting leisure-time activities for the general public. An example of the work being done under the CWA program are the free public concerts being conducted by these musicians. Monday a concert orchestra directed by Maurice Koehler will give two children's programs in Inglewood in the Inglewood theatre. Superintendent James K. Reid has announced the schedules for the training schools as follows: Inglewood, Monday at 2 p. m.; Torrance and Gardena, Tuesday at 2 p. m.; Pomona, Wednesday at 10 a. m.; El Monte, Wednesday at 2 p. m.; Compton, Friday at 2 p. m.; Bellflower, Saturday at 9 a. m. Dramatics, game leading, folk dancing, athletics, handicraft, music, nature study and story telling will be among the activities taught in the schools according to Superintendent Reid. Courses will also be given in the organization of events, safety studies and planning programs.

Schools For CWA Workers to Be Opened

More than 3500 candidates, from every section of the county are expected to compete in one of the largest examinations ever held by the county civil service commission, to be given February 11, 1934. The examination is given every two years. An eligible list of several thousand names probably will be prepared, under two grades, and from these lists will be selected not only regular clerks, as there are openings, but seasonal workers in the auditor's, assessor's, registrar of voters and board of supervisors' offices. Applicants must be at least 21 years old, and must have a full high school education or its equivalent, and at least six months' experience in office or clerical work. Clerks on the unneeded list will be paid \$4.50 a day, while Grade I clerks receive \$10 a month, and Grade 2 clerks \$115 a month, all subject to an emergency cut of 9.1 per cent in effect for all county employees.

Widow and Son of Redondo Merchant Left Large Estate

Widow and Son of Redondo Merchant Left Large Estate. The estate of stock in merchant firm in Inglewood, Gardena, Hawthorne, Ocean Park and Watts, the will of the late Perry C. Ridgley, Redondo Beach business man, was on file today in Los Angeles probate court. The \$25,000 estate was left entirely to the widow, Mrs. Edith B. Ridgley, and his son, Ward D. Ridgley. The petition asking probate of the will, filed by the son, who is named as executor, lists real property valued at \$25,000, 1200 shares of the P. C. Ridgley Company at \$25,000, other stock and bonds, \$1000 and notes and unsecured accounts at \$2500. The will was executed May 4, 1928, at which time Ridgley's age was given as 67 years.

Examination to Fill Vacancy In Agriculture Dept.

The United States civil service commission will accept applications until February 7 for the position of principal agricultural explorer to fill a vacancy in the bureau of plant industry, department of agriculture, Washington, D. C. The entrance salary ranges from \$5600 to \$6400 a year, less a deduction of not to exceed 15 per cent as a measure of economy and a retirement deduction of 2 1/2 per cent. The duties will be to plan, organize, and direct agricultural exploration in foreign countries, especially in Central and South American countries, and in high altitude areas, for the purpose of securing new and promising crop plants; and to perform other related duties. All states except Delaware, Iowa, Maryland, Vermont, Virginia, West Virginia, and the District of Columbia have received less than their share of appointments in the apportioned departmental service at Washington. Full information may be obtained from the secretary of the United States civil service board of examiners, at the post office or customhouse in this city.

Long Beach Oil Man Held Guilty of Petty Theft

Lloyd W. King, a Long Beach oil man, who was apprehended in the act of stripping sheets of galvanized iron from the Kettler Well No. 17, belonging to the C. C. M. O., Saturday, was found guilty of petty theft when arraigned before Judge C. T. Rippey Monday and was given a sentence of 150 days or 75 days in the county jail, \$100 or 50 days being suspended for two years. A stay of execution until February 21 was granted on the balance of the sentence and King was released. King gave his name to Torrance officers as Harry Johnson of Los Angeles, when he was taken into custody, and stoutly maintained his story that he had been employed by another party to strip the well, but finally admitted his identity when he appeared before Judge Rippey.
