Torrance Votes Only On School Bonds In March

Special Election Called For March 20 to Get Building Funds

Property owners in Torrance, which is served by the Los Angeles city school district, will vote upon only the school bond issue and no more at the special election to be held on March 20, by a decision of the board of supervisors.

According to the plea of Los Angeles school officials that the issue be not confused, the supervisors assured Superintendent Frank Bouelle of the Los Angeles system that a proposal to ask the voters to also pass upon a \$10,000,000 county court house issue would not be incorporated in the March 20 election. If an election is held, it will be separate. The proposal that the court house plan be voted upon the same time as the school bonds was made because of the fact that two-thirds of all Los Angeles county precincts must vote at the Los Angeles school bond election anyway. Including precincts in San Fernando, Tujunga, North Hollywood, Beverly Hills, Torrance, Bell and Eagle Rock, there are some 2300 precincts that will vote on the school bonds. Total precincts in the entire county, including those in all of the 14 cities, is some 3500. "None of our school buildings in Los Angeles have been built in conformity with the new state building code, and something must therefore be done," Superintendent Bouelle told the supervisors in pointing out the gravity of the situation and urging that all possibility of "politics" be kept out of the election.

Sometime during the week the board of education hoped to be able to fix the amount of the bond issue, tentatively announced at one time at \$30,000,000. Final date to register for the March 20 election is February 11, it was pointed out today to local residents.

A large attendance is expected at both meetings.

Permit Asked to Widen Viaduct On Western Avenue

Formal instructions to apply to the California railroad commission for permission to widen the Western avenue viaduct over the Pacific Electric railroad between Athens and Hawthorne was given the county counsel Monday by the board of supervisors. Plans and specifications for the work to be performed in widening the roadway have just been completed by the bridge division of the county road department, and will be submitted to the commission's engineers with the widening application. The viaduct is to be increased to nearly twice its present width, and is to have a pedestrian walk on either side.

L. A. Contractor Is Low Bidder On Local Improvement

C. O. Sparks, Los Angeles contractor, is expected to be awarded the contract for improvement of Torrance boulevard, between Torrance and Redondo Beach. Sparks' low bid was \$59,658. All bids were referred to George Jones, county road commissioner, for study and recommendation. Allocation of 30 per cent of the cost from the Public Works Administration has been promised the county.
