YOUR EYES and Your Glasses
Weekly Questions and Answers of Interest to Everyone

(This question commonly asked by the younger individuals who wear single vision lenses.)

Question: How often should I change my lenses?

Answer: This question can best be answered direct to the individual where the doctor has an opportunity to question the patient than in this general way. I do feel that no one should attempt to give advice of such character unless he is in a position to analyze that particular pair of eyes.

Illness or hospital experience, which changes the eyes radically, or improved health conditions—would require the eyes having attention as frequently as the body changes were noticeable. Environment and mental influences have a direct bearing upon the eyes. Therefore to be fair to yourself and your doctor you should have your eyes examined frequently.
